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Main entry: CARE

Title: Records, 1945-1985

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Access: One folder of Management files and three folders of Peace Corps personnel files are restricted until 2040; otherwise, access is unrestricted.

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Historical Statement: The international relief agency CARE was founded in 1945 to provide food and clothing to European victims of World War II. Gradually it broadened its focus to include ongoing projects in agriculture, nutrition, education, medicine, and community development, in conjunction with host governments in developing countries in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, and Latin America.

Description: Correspondence, project files, reports, minutes of meetings, press releases, posters, and other items. Materials document the policy-making decisions of CARE's Board of Directors and the implementation of those policies by the executive staff, overseas programming, publicity and fund-raising efforts of CARE's headquarters and regional field offices, and CARE's relationships with MEDICO, the Peace Corps, and CARE International.

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HISTORICAL NOTE

CARE, the international relief organization, was formally organized in November 1945. Originally, the acronym CARE stood for the Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe. In 1953, as CARE expanded its services to other continents, it became the Cooperative for American Remittances to Everywhere, and in 1959, after CARE had shifted into other types of relief work besides food distribution, it changed to its present name, the Cooperative for American Relief Everywhere.

The three people central to CARE's creation were Wallace J. Campbell, director of the New York City office of the Cooperative League of the U.S.A., Arthur Ringland of the War Relief Control Board, and Lincoln Clark of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Association. All saw the need for what they envisioned as a temporary, non-governmental organization through which Americans could send emergency packages of food to friends and relatives in post-war Europe. Although the concept was not new, CARE differed from pre-existing relief organizations in that it was non-sectarian, did not direct its efforts toward any one nationality or ethnic group, and had the single goal of providing food, rather than attempting to deal with the multiple problems of clothing, shelter, and the relocation of refugees.

With the assistance of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service, CARE's organizers found twenty-two agencies that agreed to become members of CARE, including the American Friends Service Committee, the International Rescue and Relief Committee, and Save the Children Federation.

Representatives of each organization formed CARE's Board of Directors, which drew up the articles of incorporation on November 27, 1945, and began selecting an executive director and other staff members in December. Negotiations with host governments soon followed, and delivery of the first CARE packages of food took place in France six months later.

The earliest CARE packages were surplus U.S. Army "Ten-in-One" food parcels, originally intended as G. I. rations, which had the advantage of being pre-boxed and ready for shipment. In 1946, with the help of nutritionists, CARE started to design food packages aimed at families, eliminating such items as cigarettes, to replace the Ten-in-One parcels when that supply was exhausted. The more specialized packages substituted tea for coffee in parcels sent to Britain, added spaghetti to Italian packages, and included kosher packages. Within its first two years of operations, CARE was able to offer its donors a selection of more than a dozen different packages.

CARE's original goal was to ship parcels only to individuals or agencies specified by the donors. By early 1948, however, CARE was receiving numerous undesignated contributions from

donors who wanted simply to help where the need was greatest. After much debate, the Board voted that spring to accept unspecified donations and provide more general relief. The move displeased and caused the resignation of several founding-member agencies who felt that by moving away from its original intent CARE was duplicating the efforts of existing organizations, but the response from donors was enthusiastic and contributions increased, allowing CARE personnel to expand their relief work and to begin to think of CARE as an ongoing organization, rather than a temporary one. In July 1948, CARE opened its first non-European mission, in Japan; others soon followed in India, Pakistan, and Mexico.

As the need for food abroad became less urgent, CARE initiated other forms of aid, sending farm tools and vocational training materials such as carpenter's and cobbler's kits. In 1949, CARE entered into a joint project with UNESCO to help restock libraries overseas and provide them with up-to-date scientific and technical literature. (See the description for Subseries 2.6, Book Program Files.)

CARE was providing food and self-help programs in more than forty countries when Congress passed Public Law 480, the Agricultural Trade Development Assistance Act, in July 1954. Later renamed the Food for Peace Act by President Eisenhower, P.L. 480 gave private non-profit organizations access on a regular basis to U.S. government surplus food. For CARE, it meant the ability to expand supplemental feeding programs and disaster relief operations. Within a year, "CARE packages" constituted only about 25% of CARE's expenditures, with the remainder going toward the acquisition and shipment of U.S. surplus commodities as well as tools and other self-help materials.

In July 1955, the Executive Committee of CARE's Board of Directors voted to phase out twenty-two of its forty-two missions, mostly in European countries where the need was no longer great, and to concentrate efforts in the remaining countries on the bulk distribution of surplus foods in conjunction with the host governments, and on disaster and refugee assistance. This move also met with opposition, especially among some Board members who believed that CARE had achieved its original goals and should therefore cease all operations. But a majority felt otherwise, and in its tenth year, CARE began to broaden its scope and to evolve into the major international development organization it has become. (Materials from the July 1955 debate are in the Board of Directors' subject files, Box 6.)

During the next decade, CARE continued to expand its feeding

and self-help programming and increasingly to undertake long-range development projects, with vocational kits, sewing machines, and tools gradually replacing food packages. In 1961, the directors of the newly-created Peace Corps sought CARE's assistance in training the first Peace Corps volunteers for service in Colombia; subsequent CARE-Peace Corps joint projects continued for another six years. The medical aid organization MEDICO, which had been working closely with CARE for several years, formally merged with CARE in 1962, thereby considerably increasing CARE's ability to provide trained health care personnel overseas and to distribute needed medical supplies. (For more detailed information, see the series descriptions for MEDICO, Series 7, and the Peace Corps, Series 8.)

By 1967, CARE had delivered its last traditional food package and was phasing out its vocational kits. In that same year, the organization signed its first self-help partnership agreement with another government, for the construction of schools in Honduras. Under the terms of such agreements, the host governments shared the costs of each project with CARE and with the communities affected by those projects.

The partnership agreements enabled CARE to begin development work on a larger scale. Previous projects, funded primarily by donor contributions, had been narrow and limited in scope, providing, for example, sewing machines or technical books for a specific village. Post-1967 projects were often country-wide rather than directed at a few communities, and largely entailed the construction of schools and the creation of nutrition centers. The latter became one of CARE's strongest areas of concentration; along with distributing surplus food acquired through P.L. 480, CARE also undertook nutrition education programs that were aimed especially at pregnant women and new mothers, and added a full-time nutritionist to its staff in 1969. (See the description for Subseries 2.3.)

The partnership development agreements proved so successful that in 1973, CARE instigated a multi-year planning system, essentially the one in use at present, which allowed the agency to expand and intensify the sort of programming it had been doing. Under this system, projects became more multi-faceted: for instance, a health education project might include not only instruction on the basics of disease prevention and nutrition, but also a new sanitation system to provide safe water to a community, an agricultural program to produce a high-protein grain, and an irrigation system for growing it.

The 1970s also saw the internationalization of CARE, with CARE Canada's attainment of autonomy in 1973, and the founding of CARE Europe in 1976. In 1982, representatives of the various CAREs met to create CARE International, which coordinates policy-

making and programming activities among its affiliate agencies. (See the description for Series 7, CARE International.)

Projects of the 1980s and early 1990s demonstrate CARE's increased efforts in the area of agro-forestry, particularly reforestation and soil conservation in eastern Africa and Central and South America. Along with its ongoing development work, CARE has continued to provide emergency food and shelter after natural disasters such as earthquakes and floods, and offers long-term relief assistance to victims of drought and famine, most notably in Ethiopia and Somalia. As of early 1991, there were CARE U.S.A. missions in thirty-nine nations.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The records of CARE, 1945-1985, document the organization's initial years as a temporary relief agency in post-war Europe and the evolution of its scope into international development work, with missions in Latin America, Africa, the Middle East, and Asia. The bulk of the collection dates from ca. 1950 to 1980; the volume of material drops sharply after 1980. There are also a few scattered items from 1986-1989.

Materials include the files of CARE's executive staff, project files, administrative correspondence between CARE's headquarters and its overseas missions and regional field offices in the U.S. and Canada, reports, studies, press releases, and financial records. There is also documentation on the establishment of CARE International, the activities of MEDICO, which merged with CARE in 1962, and the Peace Corps, with which CARE worked closely from 1961 to 1967. Nearly all of these materials are from CARE's central offices in New York; there are relatively few files from its overseas missions and regional offices, except in the cases of a few missions or offices that have closed.

CARE has retained certain items, including recent financial records, Human Resources Department files, and its film and picture archive. In some cases, as with donor files, materials were sampled, with the bulk remaining at or returned to CARE.

ARRANGEMENT NOTE

The collection is arranged in the following series:

Work on these records began at CARE in the early 1980s, with the establishment of the above series and some preliminary sorting. The transfer of the material to the New York Public Library and subsequent processing took place from late 1988 to 1990. As of 1991, plans were underway for future periodic transfers of CARE's inactive records to N.Y.P.L.

Materials have been left in their original order whenever that order was discernible (e.g., the numbered correspondence in Series 3). In most cases, however, the order was lost while the material was in storage at CARE, and arrangement was imposed during processing.

RELATED MATERIALS

About thirteen linear feet of material on CARE, 1948-1984, are among the files of Wallace J. Campbell at the Harry S. Truman Library, Independence, Missouri. (Campbell, one of CARE's founders, has been a member of its Board of Directors since 1945 and its President Emeritus since 1986.) Coverage is especially extensive for the meetings of CARE's Board of Directors, 1948-1979, and for the activities of CARE International in the early and mid-1980s.

The Nationwide Insurance Company Archives in Columbus, Ohio, include the papers of Murray D. Lincoln, CARE's first President (1945-1957) and the Chairman of its Board of Directors from 1957 until his death in 1966. Among his files are about half a dozen boxes containing material on CARE, mostly from the early 1950s through the mid-1960s.

The papers of Thomas A. Dooley, co-founder of MEDICO, are in the Western Historical Manuscripts Collection at the University of Missouri, St. Louis. In 1981, at the WHMC's request, CARE transferred several files of Dooley's correspondence there.

Published works about CARE include an anecdotal history by Wallace J. Campbell, <u>The History of CARE: A Personal Account</u>, (Praeger, 1990), the most detailed and up-to-date description of CARE's origins and growth to 1989. <u>American Philanthropy Abroad: A History</u> by Merle Curti (Rutgers, 1963) devotes part of one chapter to CARE's early years. <u>The Alms Race: The Impact of American Voluntary Aid Abroad</u>, by Eugene Linden (Random House, 1976), is a skeptical look at the effectiveness of relief organizations, but it does offer one perspective on aspects of CARE's operations in the 1970s.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 1 MANAGEMENT FILES

1945-1987. 91 l.f. Boxes 1-91

Series 1, Management Files, consists primarily of the records of CARE's chief policy-makers and administrators: the Board of Directors, Executive Directors and Deputy Executive Directors, several of its Assistant Executive Directors, and its General Counsel. There are also annual reports, organizational histories, and related items.

The Management Files are arranged in seven subseries:

- 1.1. General and Historical Materials
- 1.2. Board of Directors Files

Subseries descriptions follow.

<u>Subseries 1.1. General and Historical Materials</u> 1945-1987. 4 l.f. Boxes 1-4

Subseries 1.1 is comprised of materials that document CARE's origins and growth, assembled by CARE's archives staff in the early 1980s. Box 1 includes originals and revisions of CARE's articles of incorporation and by-laws, 1945-1979; correspondence concerning CARE's formal organization, 1945-1946; annual reports, 1946-1987; and promotional brochures, 1948-1987. (Related promotional literature is in Box 1006 of the records of the Public and Donor Relations Department.)

Boxes 1 through 4 also contain the typescript and research files for a history of CARE's formative years, written in 1952 by Charles Bloomstein, a CARE employee from 1948 to 1955. Along with his research materials, Bloomstein's <u>History of CARE</u> offers detailed information about CARE's founding and early operations overseas. There are several other unpublished CARE histories in Box 4, ca. 1964-1971, and biographical sketches of CARE's Board of Directors and executive staff, 1946-1985. (The Public and Donor Relations Department also kept biographical files on CARE employees to use in press releases; see Box 883.)

<u>Subseries 1.2. Board of Directors files</u> 1945-1985. 8 l.f. Boxes 5-12.

CARE's Board of Directors is responsible for determining the countries in which CARE operates, setting general policy guidelines, and selecting CARE's executive directors. When CARE was founded, the Board consisted of representatives from each of CARE's twenty-two member organizations. During the 1950s, it expanded to include public members; by the mid-1980s, nearly half of the forty Board members were public members.

Box 5 contains correspondence of CARE's Board and Executive Directors with the executive staff of its member organizations, mostly from the late 1940s to mid-1950s. There are also files of early Board memoranda, notices of meetings, and lists of Board members.

Box 6 contains subject files, 1946-1960, mostly documenting CARE's reorganization and shift in the mid-1950s from emergency relief work toward long-term feeding and self-help programs.

Boxes 7-12 hold the minutes of Board of Directors meetings and minutes of the meetings of its various committees: Executive, Finance, Policy and Planning, etc., interfiled chronologically, 1945-1985. Box 12 also includes files of Margaret Ford, who served as assistant secretary to the Board of Directors from 1952 to 1984.

Subseries 1.3. General Counsel's Files. 1945-ca. 1965. 4 l.f. Boxes 13-16.

The files in Subseries 1.3 are almost entirely those of Alexander Hawes, CARE's General Counsel from 1945 until the mid-1960s. (Some documentation of the activities of the General Counsel in the 1970s is among the files of CARE's executive directors in Box 38; other post-1965 materials are presumably still part of CARE's active files.)

Hawes's files contain the agreements and related correspondence with the governments of the countries in which CARE was operating (Boxes 13-14); correspondence with various U.S. government offices, in particular the Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid and the Economic Cooperation Administration (Boxes 14-15); registration with U.S. states for fund-raising purposes (Box 15); and subject files (Boxes 16-17). The latter, dating mostly from the 1940s and 1950s, include agreements with shipping corporations and warehouses, and negotiations with the

Union of CARE Employees. (Other files pertaining to the Union of CARE Employees are in Boxes 55 and 875.)

<u>Subseries 1.4. Executive Directors' Files</u> 1945-1985. 22 l.f. Boxes 17-38

The Executive Director of CARE carries out the policies agreed upon by the Board of Directors, and is responsible for the overall coordination of CARE's activities in the U.S. and overseas.

(In late 1990, CARE changed the job title of the executive director to that of president of CARE, while the assistant executive directors became vice-presidents. The changes, however, post-date these papers.)

As of 1991, CARE has had seven executive directors; their names and the lengths of their terms are:

Documentation is scanty for the directorships of Nelson and Haskell. There is also comparatively little material concerning Philip Johnston, whose files were mostly still in use when CARE transferred its inactive records to the New York Public Library.

Because each executive director usually passed his files along to his successor, materials in this subseries are not broken down by individual executive director; instead, they are grouped in rough chronological order and by content: country files, subject files, and so forth.

Country files, Boxes 17-22, mainly contain the executive directors' correspondence with country directors, and related documents. Topics generally concern such broad issues as changes in policies and procedures. Materials in Boxes 17-19 are from ca. 1945-1965; those in 20-22 are from 1965 to 1984.

Box 23 contains an assortment of agreements from CARE's early years with beneficiary countries, the War Assets Administration, and private shipping and warehouse firms. Related items are in the General Counsel's files, Boxes 13-16.

Boxes 24-30 are subject files, mostly from 1945 through the

mid-1950s. Those in Boxes 24-25 mainly contain correspondence with government agencies and private organizations.

Of note in Box 25 are several files that came to CARE through the estate of Margaret Folsom, CARE's supervisor of foreign files from 1946 to 1947. Folsom's correspondence with CARE relief workers in Europe and the "Communiques from CARE," which she compiled from their incoming letters and sent to the various overseas missions, provide much information about CARE's early operations as well as conditions in post-war Europe.

Subject files in Boxes 26-30 include extensive correspondence with the Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid, a division of the State Department, with which all private international relief agencies must be registered (Box 26); the CARE Development Corporation, an endeavor to import and sell handicrafts produced in developing countries (Box 28); and the National CARE Advisory Committee, an aggregate of business and industrial leaders who consulted periodically with CARE executive staff on aspects of CARE's programming (Box 30).

Subject files in Boxes 31-35 are mostly those of Frank Goffio, the executive director from 1962 to 1979, and his successor, Lou Samia. Like Boxes 24-30, these boxes largely contain correspondence with government agencies and private organizations, as well as with CARE's affiliates in Canada and Europe.

Box 36 contains files of executive director Philip Johnston, 1981-1985. Much of this material documents the re-opening of CARE's mission in Poland in 1981.

Files kept by the various executive directors on their interactions with the Board of Directors and the General Counsel are in Boxes 37 and 38, respectively.

<u>Subseries 1.5. Deputy Executive Directors' Files</u> 1953-1987. 30 l.f. Boxes 39-68

The Deputy Executive Directors of CARE assist the Executive Director in managing CARE's operations. Boxes 39-50 are the files of Fred Devine, Deputy Executive Director since 1957, and Senior Deputy Executive Director from the mid-1960s until his retirement in 1987. Devine's chief responsibility was the administration of the Program Department's many activities, in particular legislation and government requirements for the operations of food programs using P.L. 480 commodities.

Boxes 51-67 contain the files of Lou Samia, who served jointly with Devine as Deputy Executive Director from 1967 until 1979, when he became Executive Director. An accountant, Samia oversaw CARE's financial transactions and such related matters as

union negotiations.

Fred Devine's country and subject files (Boxes 40-47) are similar in content to those of the Executive Director, but usually pertain to specific problems or procedures, such as the shipment of a certain commodity, and are in general more recent, with many items from the early 1980s. Boxes 48-50 deal with CARE's feeding and nutrition education programs, in particular their relationships with the Agency for International Development and other U.S. government offices.

Boxes 51-55 are the subject files of Lou Samia, consisting largely of departmental budgets, fund-raising statistics, and related items. Boxes 56-58 contain correspondence and other materials concerning the International Service Agencies, of which Samia served as treasurer. The ISA, a confederation of several non-profit organizations, including CARE, sought contributions collectively through the Combined Federal Campaign (Federal Service Joint Crusade), a fund-raising effort aimed at U.S. government employees.

The bulk of Samia's files, Boxes 59-67, are his overseas files, in particular his reports on visits to CARE's various missions, ca. 1967-1979. Box 68, country files, are the combined files of both deputy executive directors; they mostly contain copies of basic agreements and other contracts with each country, program plans, and related information.

<u>Subseries 1.6. Assistant Executive Directors' Files.</u> 1946-1985. 16 l.f. Boxes 69-84.

The Assistant Executive Directors at CARE are usually in charge of a department--e.g., the Program Department or Overseas Operations. This subseries contains files of those A.E.D.s whose work is not clearly related to the activities of a single division.

Boxes 69-72 are the files of Abram Becker, an A.E.D. of CARE from ca. 1958 to 1962. Becker's responsibilities included personnel matters and fund-raising, especially among CARE member agencies.

Boxes 73-77 are Lou Samia's files. (Samia served as an A.E.D. from 1958 to 1967; there is some overlap with his Deputy Executive Director files.) Boxes 73-74, subject files from 1954 to 1969, include correspondence with a variety of agencies and organizations, both members and non-members of CARE. Box 75 documents CARE's long-standing relationship with Nationwide Insurance Company, which in 1960 initiated an ongoing program through which its employees contribute to CARE. Samia's A.E.D.

files also include materials from the Vick's CARE Crusade, 1960-1961 (Boxes 76-77), a contest sponsored by the Vick Chemical Company with proceeds going to CARE.

Boxes 78-82 contain the files of James Lambie, an A.E.D. from 1961 to ca. 1972. Lambie, who appears on CARE's 1969 organizational chart as the A.E.D. for "special assignments," was based in Washington, DC as the liaison between CARE and various federal offices and agencies, including the Peace Corps. (See the description for Subseries 8.3.) His subject files, Boxes 78-79, include material on congressional committees and subcommittees on agriculture and the status of refugees, and the 1965 White House conference on International Cooperation Year.

Boxes 80-82 hold Lambie's files on the International Service Agencies; Lambie evidently succeeded Samia as CARE's representative to that federation.

Boxes 83-84 contain A.E.D. George Radcliffe's correspondence with country directors and other mission personnel, 1980-1985, mostly concerning changes in personnel and related matters. Radcliffe apparently had administrative responsibility for both the Program Department and Overseas Operations in the early 1980s, and by 1985 held the title of A.E.D. for CARE's International Service Unit.

Subseries 1.7. Other Materials 1970-1984. 7 l.f. Boxes 85-91.

There are two categories of material in this subseries: confidential letters, 1971-1984, and files concerning the use of the name CARE by other organizations.

The confidential letters, Boxes 85-89, are a separate series of numbered letters, similar to those in Overseas Operations, between CARE's executive staff and mission administrators. Despite the "confidential" designation, their confidentiality usually had a short time frame. They contain little information that is still of a sensitive nature; most concern employee transfers and other personnel changes, and procedural issues. The files are alphabetical by country.

Boxes 90-91 contain correspondence from CARE's executive directors and attorneys to organizations with names or acronyms similar to CARE: e.g., "We Care" and "Concerned Adults for Reading Enrichment", advising them of possible copyright infringement.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 2 PROGRAM DEPARTMENT

1949-1986 (bulk 1958-1980). 435 l.f. Boxes 92-526

Originally called the Technical Assistance and Self-Help Programs Department and later the Research and Development Department, the Program Department is responsible for planning and implementing CARE's overseas projects in agriculture, nutrition, health and medicine, construction, and education. Program Department materials include administrators' files, particularly those of the nutritionists and the assistant director responsible for obtaining surplus agricultural commodities; country project files; departmental annual reports; and assorted forms, reports, and manuals.

Series 2 consists of seven subseries:

- 2.1. Assistant Executive Directors' files
- 2.2. Program Department Directors' files
- 2.3. Program Department Assistant Director's files
- 2.4. Other administrators' files
- 2.5. Country project files
- 2.6. Book Program files
- 2.7. Various administrative materials

Subseries descriptions follow.

<u>Subseries 2.1. Assistant Executive Directors' Files</u> 1957-1980. 12 l.f. Boxes 92-103

Files of Gordon Alderfer, the A.E.D. for the department from 1960 to 1964 (Boxes 92-95), and F. Merton Cregger, A.E.D. from ca. 1966-1980 (Boxes 96-103).

Boxes 92-95, Alderfer's files, consist entirely of subject files, ca. 1959-1964, mostly containing correspondence with CARE member agencies and other relief organizations. About one-fourth of the files in Box 94 pertain to CARE's relationship with the Peace Corps.

Boxes 96-98 of Mert Cregger's files are also subject files, ca. 1966-1980, containing material on conferences, administrative matters, and special events such as International Women's Year,

1975, as well as correspondence with other organizations. Box 99, country files, holds mostly correspondence with CARE mission chiefs.

Boxes 101-102, Haiti-HACHO files, 1965-1973, document CARE's relationship with HACHO (Haitian-American Community Help Organization), a private organization based in Port-au-Prince that emphasized public health and nutrition education. Items include progress reports, statistics, and minutes of HACHO Board of Directors meetings.

Box 102 contains the A.E.D.'s files on CARE's nutrition programming, chiefly its workshops for CARE overseas staff and its A.I.D.-funded grants for food distribution and nutrition education programs. (See also the nutritionists' files, Boxes 169-171). Box 103, Planning Group materials, 1972-1977, covers Cregger's participation in the design of CARE's multi-year programming system.

<u>Subseries 2.2: Program Department Directors' Files</u> 1959-1984 (bulk 1973-1981). 11 l.f. Boxes 104-114

Country and subject files of the Program Department Director, mostly from 1973 through 1984. The Director was primarily responsible for the administration of the division and the coordination of its activities with other CARE divisions and with mission personnel.

Although the position of Program Department Director (called the Research and Development Director before 1960) has existed since the late 1950s, Subseries 2.2 consists almost entirely of the files of the Program Department Director from 1973 to 1984, Ralph Devone. There is little pre-1970 material; it is likely that those earlier files were incorporated with those in Subseries 2.5 and 2.7.

Among Devone's files are subject files (Boxes 104 and 109-110); memos and other correspondence with CARE staff, especially Program Department personnel (Box 105); correspondence with other organizations (Box 106); and site reports, country agreements, numbered correspondence and other communications with missions (Boxes 107-108 and 111-112). Boxes 113 and 114 contain chronological files of administrative correspondence, alphabetical by country within each year, from 1959-1960 and 1972-1984.

<u>Subseries 2.3: Program Department Assistant Directors' Files</u> 1950-1986 (bulk 1955-1981). 72 l.f. Boxes 115-186.

Subseries 2.3 consists of two groups of material: the files of the Assistant Director, William Langdon (Boxes 115-166), and

those of CARE's nutritionists (Boxes 167-186), who worked closely with him.

Assistant Director's Files:

William Langdon began working for CARE in the early 1950s, in the Order Section of the Remittance Department. By 1958, he was the Procurement Department employee in charge of surplus agricultural commodities; as a result of administrative changes in 1962, he became the head of the Program Department's Food and Agriculture Program. In 1969, his job title changed to Assistant Director of the Program Department.

Langdon's primary responsibilities were the acquisition and distribution of U.S. agricultural surplus commodities that were available through Public Law 480. Boxes 115-121, administrative files, contain Langdon's correspondence with other CARE employees, chiefly executive staff and Finance and Procurement personnel, and with A.I.D. and other government agencies, private relief organizations, and the manufacturers of supplemental protein products. These files, arranged by year, are from 1968 (with a few items in Box 115 from 1960-1964) and 1973-1984. The whereabouts of earlier material and files from 1969-1972 are unknown.

Boxes 122-151 are country files, ca. 1957-1968 and 1973-1982, with a few files from 1983-1987. As with Boxes 115-121, there is no material from 1969-1972. The files, arranged alphabetically by country, consist mostly of correspondence with mission personnel concerning food distribution programs, the shipment and distribution of foodstuffs, and related matters. There are also scattered copies of country agreements and annual estimates of requirements (A.E.R.s) submitted by mission chiefs, requesting specific commodities and itemizing the uses to which they would be put: e.g., school lunch programs, maternal-child welfare programs, and so forth.

Boxes 152-155 contain A.I.D. audit and self-audit reports that the A.I.D. periodically required, and related correspondence, ca. 1962-1985. The reports list in detail the types and amounts of commodities shipped, and any problems in transporting and storing them. These files are alphabetical by country.

In Boxes 156-157 are Langdon's files on CARE's overseas projects, especially, though not exclusively, those that were food and nutrition education-related. The files, alphabetical by country, mostly contain correspondence with mission chiefs, as well as scattered clippings, reports, and other items.

Box 158 holds files on the various commodities CARE obtained under the provisions of P.L. 480: rolled wheat, vegetable oil, fish flour, etc. Contents are primarily correspondence and informational literature, including recipes, from the U.S. Department of Agriculture and from manufacturers and such agencies as the Soybean Council of America and the Millers' National Federation. (Related materials are in Box 173.)

Boxes 159-166 contain miscellaneous subject files that do not fit readily into any of the above categories. They are arranged in rough chronological order, from 1950 to 1987. Materials include budget estimates (Boxes 162 and 163), evaluations of P.L. 480 programming (Boxes 164 and 166), and quarterly shipping reports (Box 165).

Nutritionists' files:

In 1969, CARE added a nutritionist to its Program Department staff to work with William Langdon in assessing and improving P.L. 480's effectiveness in feeding programs. In conjunction with mission personnel and host countries' ministries of education and social welfare, the nutritionist advised mission personnel on the development and implementation of feeding programs, nutritional education curricula, and projects to increase local food production.

CARE's first nutritionist (later called the nutrition advisor) was Margot Higgins; she was succeeded by Mary Ann Anderson in 1973. Merlyn Vemury held that position from 1976 to 1982, when Ruth Ann Horner succeeded her. Most of the items in Boxes 167-186 are from 1969 on, although there are a few earlier reports and related items.

During the 1960s and 1970s, grants from the Agency for International Development provided much of the funding for CARE's large-scale nutrition projects, in particular a study of supplementary feeding programs for preschool children in Colombia, Costa Rica, the Dominican Republic, India, and Pakistan, ca. 1974-1977. The files in Boxes 169 and 170 contain surveys, progress reports, and working papers from that study. Box 171 holds the reports from another A.I.D.-funded project, ca. 1978-1981, a study on the beliefs and practices that affected food habits in Bangladesh, Colombia, Guatemala, Jordan, Peru, and Tunisia.

Other materials include files on nutrition education in various regions and countries (Box 174), the manuals, storyboards, and comic books used to teach about nutrition (Box 175. See also the oversized posters and related items in Series 9, Boxes 1166 and 1167), and files on other institutions and

programs, such as Catholic Relief Services and Project Concern (Box 176).

Boxes 177-186, the nutritionists' country files, primarily contain correspondence between the nutritionist and mission staff members concerning such matters as regional nutrition planning workshops, A.I.D. projects, and the testing of food supplements.

<u>Subseries 2.4: Other Administrators' Files</u> 1954-1984. 13 l.f. Boxes 187-199.

Subseries 2.4 contains the files of various Program Department administrators for whom there is little other documentation, because in most cases the bulk of their records were still in use at the time CARE's papers came to the New York Public Library. Exceptions are the files of Jinty Edgar, Director of the Research Division of the Research and Development Department from ca. 1954 to 1960. Her papers (Boxes 187-188) contain information on institutional donors and on some of CARE's early projects; e.g., its agricultural tool program in Egypt in the 1950s.

This subseries also includes files of Margaret Ford, the Program Administrator from 1973 to 1980. Boxes 189-191 document her participation in International Women's Year (1975) and the United Nations Decade for Women, and her work as the liaison with C.I.D.A. (Canadian International Development Agency), CARE Canada, and CARE's New York headquarters.

Boxes 192-195 contain records of the Regional Program Officers for Africa and Asia, which consist primarily of reports, papers, and grant proposals for projects in various countries. Most of these materials are from the early 1980s.

Box 196 holds the files of Helen Seidler, CARE's Director of Education, a relatively new position. These records include correspondence from mid-1982 to December 1983, arranged chronologically; and memos, notes, and other materials from a 1984 conference for country directors.

The contents of Box 197 are the files of Ellen Lieber, Director of Information, another recently-created position. Items include intra-CARE correspondence, especially concerning CARE Europe.

Boxes 198 and 199 are the files of various administrative assistants to the Program Department's Assistant Executive Director, which date mostly from the late 1970s through the mid-1980s. They consist chiefly of forms and reports from long-range planning projects, and Program Department officers' visits to missions. About a fourth of the files in Box 199 deal with

CARE's relief efforts for famine victims in Ethiopia in 1984.

<u>Subseries 2.5. Country Project Files</u> 1952-1987 (bulk 1960-1980). 274 l.f. Boxes 200-473.

The files in Subseries 2.5 document the individual projects undertaken by CARE in sixty-three countries, from the early 1950s through the mid-1980s. Except for the files in Boxes 200 and 201, which are grouped together by continent (Africa and Europe), materials are arranged alphabetically by country and in approximate chronological order therein.

The nature of the projects varied widely, from providing farming tools and vocational kits to building schools and clinics, improving roads and waterways, and maintaining feeding programs based on P.L. 480 commodities. After 1970, MEDICO's training programs for hospital and clinic personnel also came under the administration of the Program Department.

Early projects (ca. 1952-1974) tended to be limited to one or several sites and purposes, and funded mainly by donor contributions. With the implementation of multi-year planning in 1975, projects became long-term and broader in scope and location, with more overall financial involvement from host governments and supplemental grant funding. For instance, one 1970 project in Chile was the renovation of a Valparaiso nursery school, paid for by a \$247.00 donation from a former Peace Corps volunteer, whereas a similar project in 1977 provided for the construction of more than 200 nursery schools and kindergartens throughout Chile over the next several years, jointly funded by CARE and the Chilean Ministry of Education.

Each country's projects are numbered separately. Pre-1975 projects have sequential numbers with the year added as a suffix: e.g., Guatemala #230-66. Under the multi-year planning system, each new project received a five-digit PCN (project control number), with the last digit or digits standing for the year(s) in which the project began. (A more detailed explanation of the project control numbering system is in the CARE Program Manual, v. 3, 1979, in Box 525.)

Most project files contain a project proposal, usually submitted by a mission chief, and related correspondence with CARE headquarters; supportive documents, such as blueprints or maps; and in the cases of projects co-sponsored by the host government or funded by outside agencies, copies of country agreements and grants. Post-1975 boxes also include separate folders for quarterly and trimester progress reports submitted by country directors, annual implementation plans (A.I.P.s) detailing projected and actual expenditures and activities for each fiscal year, and correspondence.

For some countries, the records of the regional program

officer (R.P.O.) are available, filed at the end of the sequence for those countries. These materials, ca. 1974-1985, consist chiefly of correspondence with mission chiefs and other CARE personnel, A.I.P.s, and project implementation evaluations (P.I.E.s), periodically submitted by missions to CARE headquarters. Duplicates of many of these items are in the regular country project files.

Files from the Chile, Jordan, Liberia, and Tunisia missions were returned to CARE upon termination of CARE's operations in those countries, and are also included in this subseries. Arranged according to CARE's Universal Filing System (see Box 525), these files contain many items duplicated in other parts of the collection, but also feature correspondence with the host government, minutes of mission staff meetings, and related materials.

Subseries 2.6. Book Program Files 1949-1962. 17 l.f. Boxes 474-490.

In the fall of 1948, UNESCO contacted CARE about the need for rebuilding European libraries that had been destroyed in the war, and providing scientific and technical books to developing countries. CARE agreed to join with UNESCO in its plans to send such materials overseas, and formed the CARE Book Advisory and Bibliography Committee, chaired by Luther Evans of the Library of Congress. Working with representatives from the American Library Association, the National Education Association, and other groups, the Committee compiled a bibliography of pertinent titles and began a fund-raising campaign for the project, directed mainly at professional associations and civic groups. The CARE-UNESCO Book Program sent its first shipment of books in July 1949, to the Louvain Library in Brussels, Belgium.

In October 1950, the Book Program expanded to include a Children's Book Fund, which provided books, mostly by American authors, to school and public libraries overseas. Under the slogan "Make Friends Through Books," many U. S. classrooms or children's service clubs "adopted" a school or library overseas, raising funds to send packages of books to them.

In 1955, the United States Information Service recruited CARE's assistance in distributing its American Bookshelf, a collection of ninety-nine paperback books, mostly literature, history, and biographies, selected for overseas audiences by the U.S. Information Agency as representative of what Americans were reading. CARE included the Bookshelf in its Book Program fundraising until 1959, when it received objections from the National

Information Bureau, a private organization that monitored the activities of non-profit groups for prospective donors. The N.I.B. felt that it was inappropriate for CARE to act as a propagandist for the U.S.I.A., and at its recommendation, CARE ceased its support of the American Bookshelf.

While the CARE-UNESCO Book Program, Children's Book Fund, and the American Bookshelf enjoyed moderate support from donors, none of them ever had the mass appeal that food and self-help packages did. By the early 1960s, the Book Program had come to an end.

Boxes 474-485 contain the correspondence and subject files of CARE's Book Program personnel, in particular Flavel Barnes, chief of the Education Section of the Self-Help Program, and Patricia Freeman, Director of the Book Program. Boxes 475-479 contain donor and administrative files, roughly two-thirds of which consist of correspondence with donor organizations, especially the American Library Association and the National Congress of Parents and Teachers (P.T.A.). Box 480 contains the Children's Book Fund files, chiefly fact sheets, mailings, and other informational literature, and thank-you letters from children and teachers in a variety of countries. Correspondence with fund-raising groups at schools, colleges, and libraries is in Boxes 481-482, filed alphabetically by state. Boxes 483-485 hold correspondence with mission personnel, alphabetical by country. Most concern book shipments to those countries.

Boxes 486-487 contain the correspondence of Roy McCorkle, the director of CARE's Self-Help Program in the early 1950s, primarily documenting outreach and fund-raising efforts. American Bookshelf files are in Boxes 488-489; they consist mainly of progress reports and examples of publicity for the Bookshelf, correspondence with individual donors, and with fund-raising organizations such as the Fraternal Order of Eagles and regional Rotary Clubs.

The bibliographies of scientific and technical books produced by the Book Program's Advisory Committee are in Box 490. The earliest is dated 1950; there are updated versions through 1961-1962.

<u>Subseries 2.7. Various Administrative Materials</u> 1958-1986. 36 l.f. Boxes 491-526

Subseries 2.7 consists mostly of assorted forms, reports, and other items generated by the Program Department that did not come to the New York Public Library as part of the files of a specific person or country. A number of the reports were

apparently once part of CARE's in-house library. Copies of many items in this subseries, especially the agreements and forms, are also in the appropriate country project files.

Forms

Boxes 491-502 contain a variety of forms, most of them originating with the multi-year planning system in 1975. Exceptions are the action forms from 1958-1974, filed alphabetically by country in Boxes 491-496. The action forms, originally kept in looseleaf binders, are the program proposal approval forms for each project; taken together, they provide an overview of CARE's activities in each country up to 1974. Copies of these forms are also in the appropriate country project files.

Box 497 also includes pre-1975 materials: the Self-Help Agreements, or Partnership Development Projects (P.D.P.s) and Broadened Partnership Agreements (B.P.A.s) carried out in conjunction with host governments and local communities, ca. 1969-1973, filed by agreement number.

Box 498 contains copies of the agreements with host governments for each project, alphabetically by country, ca. 1974-1981. Project agreements, ca. 1976-1985, are in Box 499, filed by country and by PCN (Project Control Number) therein.

Box 500 mostly contains project approval forms, especially the post-1975 Annual Implentation Plan forms (A.I.P.s), by country. Boxes 500-502 also hold APDs, the forms issued at the beginning of each multi-year planning period (APD-1s); upon approval of the basic elements of each project (APD-2s); and upon authorization for full implementation of those projects (APD-3s), 1975-1984. Additionally, Box 502 includes a set of Multi-Year Plan fact sheets and country program profiles, by country, 1975-1979, and a set of planning, implementation, and evaluation memos (P.I.E.s), 1979-1980, periodically submitted by mission personnel to CARE program staff, chiefly for record-keeping purposes.

Reports

Boxes 503-514 contain an assortment of reports, largely produced by the Program Department in the 1950s through the 1980s.

Box 503 consists mostly of the Program Department's annual reports to CARE's Board of Directors, 1967-1982. Along with the project resumes and summaries, also in Box 503, they offer a useful synopsis of CARE's activities in all countries for each year.

The contents of Box 504 are reports and position papers, 1958-1984 and undated, mainly pertaining to Program Department administrative procedures or describing CARE's activities in certain areas, such as health care and refugee assistance. The contents of Box 505 are similar, but chiefly concern specific projects. About two-thirds are evaluations or "category reports" on agriculture, community development, nutrition, and education projects. Items date from 1958 to 1983, but are mostly pre-1975.

Roughly one-third of Box 506 consists of mission directors' discursive reports, interfiled with country fact sheets and press releases, 1954-1959, filed alphabetically by country. (A more comprehensive set of discursive reports is in Subseries 3.7.) The remaining two-thirds contain country program rationales, 1964-1973, alphabetical by country and chronological therein, which are useful summaries of CARE's varied activities in a country for each year.

Box 507 mostly holds country post reports, 1976-1978, prepared by country directors for new overseas staff members. The reports provide background information on the geography and climate of each country, available housing, schools, social and recreational facilities, and so forth. There are also files of general information on various countries, 1963-1984.

Boxes 508-513 contain a wide variety of country reports, some of which may also be among the project files in Boxes 200-473. These reports include studies by outside consultants and by CARE of specific CARE projects, such as its reforestation program in Chad in the 1970s. There are also comprehensive studies of all of CARE's activities in a certain country. The reports date from 1958 to 1984, and are arranged alphabetically by country.

The contents of Box 514 are the reports of CARE executives on their visits to various missions, describing the status of ongoing projects and making recommendations as needed. The trip reports date from 1958 to 1985; most are from the 1970s.

Miscellaneous Materials

The miscellaneous items in Subseries 2.7 are materials that the Program Department created and/or maintained, but which evidently were shared by several people or units.

Boxes 515-518 contain files on Contributions-in Kind (C.I.K.s), the donations of foodstuffs, clothing, cleaning products and other goods from their manufacturers, ca. 1965-1970. The files are arranged by the C.I.K. number assigned to each donation, more or less in chronological order. Box 519 contains Program Department files on donor organizations, chiefly such non-profit groups as the American Legion and the General

Federation of Women's Clubs. The files are alphabetical by name of organization. (The bulk of CARE's files on corporate donors is in Series 4, Subseries 4.4.)

Box 520, disaster files, consists mostly of reports, fact sheets, and position papers produced by the Program Department staff, mostly dealing with the problems of refugees from World War II and the East Asian conflicts of the 1950s and 1960s. Materials date from the 1950s to 1984.

For a more complete set of materials documenting CARE's response to natural and human-made disasters, see Subseries 3.8., Boxes 843-848.

Box 521 contains files from CARE's Agricultural/Natural Resources Unit, which the Program Department established in the early 1980s. Contents are mostly implementation plans (A.I.P.s and P.I.E.s) for agricultural and reforestation projects in Latin America, Africa, and Asia, ca. 1985.

Box 522 holds Program Department correspondence, 1967-1984: inter-office memos, letters to field staff, cables, etc., from various staff members, evidently kept together as central divisional files. Similarly, Box 523 contains an assortment of subject files, arranged alphabetically, ca. 1964-1984, mostly on public health, nutrition, and family planning issues. Box 524 contains files of correspondence, mostly from Program Department administrators, concerning meetings, administrative changes, Contributions-in-Kind, and other matters, ca. 1973-1981.

Boxes 525 and 526 contain employee manuals on Food for Peace guidelines, accounting and programming procedures, disaster policies, and so forth, 1965-1983, and undated.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 3 OVERSEAS OPERATIONS

1946-1984. 324 l.f. Boxes 527-851

Working in conjunction with the mission chiefs, the Overseas Operations Department staff is responsible for the administration of CARE's missions, including the acquisition and maintenance of supplies and equipment, the dissemination of information to and from each mission, and personnel and budgetary matters.

Over ninety percent of this series consists of intra-CARE correspondence, in particular the numbered letters and cables exchanged between each mission and CARE headquarters in New York, and the log books in which each item of correspondence was recorded. There are also relatively complete runs of CARE's numbered administrative memos, 1947-1983, and ALMISes (letters from headquarters to all missions), 1957-1986.

The remainder of materials in Series 3 consists of administrators' files, chiefly those of Bertran Smucker, who in 1958 became the director of Overseas Operations (then a division of Operations), and was the assistant executive director of Overseas Operations from 1965 to 1979. The series also includes a fairly complete run of discursive reports by country directors, 1946-1984; disaster files documenting CARE's response to natural catastrophes such as floods and earthquakes; and reports and other items from CARE's world and regional conferences.

Series 3 is arranged in nine subseries:

- 3.1. Administrators' files
- 3.2. Numbered country correspondence
- 3.3. Log books
- 3.4. Unnumbered cables
- 3.5. ALMISes
- 3.6. Numbered administrative memos
- 3.7. Discursive reports
- 3.8. Disasters
- 3.9. World and regional conferences

<u>Subseries 3.1. Administrators' Files.</u> 1946-1981. 11 l.f. Boxes 527-537

Country agreements and contracts, correspondence, reports, shipping information, and other items from CARE's Overseas Operations assistant executive directors and assistant directors. This is a relatively small subseries; many other files were apparently discarded over the years.

Boxes 527-528, departmental files, and Box 529, country and regional files, are chiefly from the late 1940s through the mid-1950s, and are mostly those of the A.E.D., his administrative assistant, and the regional directors. Of note in Box 529 are the lengthy letters and reports from mission chiefs describing conditions overseas in such countries as Hungary, Laos, and Vietnam.

Boxes 530-531 are the subject files of A.E.D. Bertran Smucker, 1955-1979. Box 530 consists mostly of Smucker's files on CARE World Conferences, 1955-1961: country directors' reports, agendas, and other planning materials. There are also several folders on the selection and training of the first contingent of Peace Corps volunteers in 1961.

Boxes 532-537 are the files of Fred Davis, Director of Training for CARE's overseas personnel. Davis created his own numbering system for his files; a guide to it is in Box 532. Many of these materials, particularly those in Boxes 532 and 533, are useful in understanding CARE's structure and the functions of its various departments.

<u>Subseries 3.2. Numbered Country Correspondence.</u> 1947-1984. 280 l.f. Boxes 538-817 Arrangement: chronological, and alphabetical by country within each year.

In 1946, in order to keep track of the increasingly heavy correspondence between its New York office and the overseas missions, CARE began assigning numbers to all such intra-CARE letters and cables as they were written. Each country's correspondence has its own numbering sequence, and outgoing and incoming letters are numbered separately: for example, Poland-New York letter #2432 was a response to New York-Poland letter #1951.

A carbon copy of each numbered letter (or a mimeograph of each cable) routinely goes to the Overseas Operations Department for its numbered correspondence files. Thus, while copies of these items are found throughout CARE's papers, Subseries 3.2 is the all-inclusive collection of letters and cables between CARE headquarters and each mission in the order in which they were

written.

The correspondence is mostly of a routine nature, concerning such matters as the shipment of commodities, visits from representatives of fund-raising organizations to project sites, staff leave reports, and purchase of motor vehicles. The looseleaf books in which CARE's New York staff recorded the numbers, dates, and recipients of each letter and briefly described their contents provide an overview of the topics covered in the numbered correspondence. (See Subseries 3.3, Log Books, Boxes 818-828.)

Boxes 538-812 contain the numbered correspondence from 1947 through 1984, filed by year and alphabetical by country within each year. Box 813 holds numbered correspondence between CARE-MEDICO's Washington D.C. office and MEDICO countries, 1971-1978. Other MEDICO-related files, by country, are scattered throughout Subseries 3.2.

Boxes 814-815, country files, 1980-1984, contain both numbered and unnumbered correspondence, alphabetical by country. The contents of Boxes 816 and 817, new country files, pertain mostly to proposals to initiate or resume operations in non-CARE countries. Box 817 also holds files on the closing of missions in some CARE countries.

Readers should note that in Subseries 3.2, files for countries that have changed their names are under the name in use at or near the time the files were created. For example, correspondence to and from Ceylon, which became Sri Lanka in 1972, is under Ceylon through 1973 but under Sri Lanka thereafter. In using this subseries, researchers interested in CARE's activities in one country over a long period of time should look under all forms of that country's name.

<u>Subseries 3.3. Log Books.</u> 1947-1980 (bulk 1958-1980). 11 l.f. Boxes 818-828. Arrangement: by volume number; roughly alphabetical by country.

The 110 looseleaf binders that comprise Subseries 3.3 serve as a rough index, by item number, to the correspondence in Subseries 3.2. As mentioned above, each entry includes the letter or cable number, date, topic, the name of the sender or recipient at CARE headquarters, and, where applicable, the item number of the letter or cable it answers.

In this subseries, there is no consistency for the location of materials for countries that have changed their names. For instance, entries for British Honduras, which became Belize in 1981, are in volumes 15 and 16 under Belize, but entries for Bangladesh (volumes 13 and 14) can also be found under its

previous name, East Pakistan, in volume 90.

<u>Subseries 3.4. Unnumbered Cables.</u> 1974-1984. 4 l.f. Boxes 829-832. Arrangement: chronological.

The unnumbered cables in Subseries 3.4 are to and from United Nations personnel and foreign government officials as well as CARE personnel. They concern a wide range of topics, from disaster assistance to the confirmation of travel plans. There is also substantial correspondence between CARE U.S.A. and its international affiliates.

<u>Subseries 3.5. ALMIS Master Files.</u> 1957-1986. 5 l.f. Boxes 833-837. Arrangement: by ALMIS number.

In 1957, CARE began issuing a separate numbered letter series of ALMISes, memos from CARE headquarters to all missions. Like the numbered country correspondence, ALMISes generally pertain to such broad administrative matters as the preparation of annual budgets, updates on procedural matters, personnel changes, and information on publicity for CARE, often sent with copies of pertinent articles or clippings.

The run of ALMISes in Boxes 833-837 is mostly complete. A file in Box 833 includes an index of ALMISes from 1970 through 1988, similar in format to the log books; unfortunately, it is a photocopy and hard to read.

Subseries 3.6. Administrative Memos. 1947-1983. 1 l.f. Box 838.

The numbered administrative memos in Subseries 3.6 are issued by CARE's executive director, most often to CARE headquarters staff but occasionally to field office and overseas personnel also. Topics usually concern such routine matters as paid holidays, minor changes in procedures, and the appointment and transfer of staff members. This subseries also includes brief runs of other numbered administrative memos from the late 1940s, and ALMEDs (numbered memos from the assistant executive director for MEDICO to all MEDICO teams), 1968 and 1970.

<u>Subseries 3.7. Discursive Reports</u> 1946-1984. 4 l.f. Boxes 839-842 Arrangement: alphabetical by country.

Soon after establishing its overseas missions, CARE began requiring monthly reports (later quarterly) from its country directors for distribution throughout CARE, particularly for the

Public Relations Department to use in preparing brochures, press releases, and other information about CARE. These discursive reports, initially consisting of a statistical and a narrative section, summarized the mission's accomplishments in feeding programs, self-help projects (school construction, potable water systems, etc.), MEDICO and Peace Corps activities, and disaster relief efforts, and often contained observations on changing political and economic conditions. CARE discontinued the discursives in 1973 but resumed them in 1977 on a bi-annual basis. It discontinued them again in September 1984.

<u>Subseries 3.8. Disaster Files.</u> 1953-1984. 6 l.f. Boxes 843-848 Arrangement: chronological

Contents of files in this subseries are chiefly cables, letters, and reports issued by the Agency for International Development and the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service as well as CARE, documenting CARE's response to the devastation caused by earthquakes, floods, hurricanes, droughts, civil strife, and other such events. Researchers should note that the files are arranged by date, rather than by name of country.

<u>Subseries 3.9. World and Regional Conferences.</u> 1949-1980. 3 l.f. Boxes 849-851 Arrangement: chronological

Since 1949, CARE has held world and regional conferences for its staff members at regular intervals. The regional conferences are primarily for CARE headquarters staff to inform overseas personnel of any changes in programming policies and administrative procedures, and to allow mission chiefs to report on activities in their countries. The world conferences, held approximately every ten years, are devoted to long-range planning issues: improvements in certain types of programming, discontinuance of others, and so on. These files consist mostly of planning correspondence and information packets, and reports presented at the conferences. Documentation is especially strong for the CARE World Conference of May 1980, held at West Point, New York.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 4 PUBLIC AND DONOR RELATIONS DEPARTMENT

1946-1989 (bulk 1962-1980). 158 l.f. Boxes 852-1010.

The Public and Donor Relations Department has grown faster and changed its structure more frequently than other CARE departments. From about 1962 to 1980, when the bulk of these papers were created, it consisted of two main units: the Publicity or Public Relations Division (later Public Information, and now called Communications), which handled routine external inquiries about CARE and prepared and disseminated press releases and radio and television spots about CARE; and the National Field Operations Division (also called Field Services, Resource Development, and currently Development), which oversaw CARE's fund-raising activities, especially through its regional offices. Each division had its own director, who reported to the Assistant Executive Director of Public and Donor Relations.

The Donor Services Division, which maintains information on individual and institutional contributors, has at various times been a separate unit, a part of Public Relations, and a subdivision of Resource Development. It appears here as a separate subseries.

There are five subseries in Series 4:

<u>Subseries 4.1. Assistant Executive Directors' Files.</u>
1956-1984. 19 l.f. Boxes 852-870. Arrangement: chronological by A.E.D.

Files of John Habberton (1956-1958), Harry Cooper (1961-1966), Jack Thacher (1965-1980), and Ron Burkard (1979-1984). The Public and Donor Relations A.E.D. oversees the day-to-day operations of the Department and is primarily responsible for long-range planning and setting goals. Boxes 852-870 contain correspondence, chiefly with other CARE administrators, mission chiefs, and field staff; scattered press releases, reports, photographs, and other items. About one-fourth of these files

(Boxes 863-867) pertains to publicizing the work of MEDICO to donors and potential participants in its visiting volunteer specialist program.

Subseries 4.2. Public Relations Division Files.
1947-1985 12 l.f. Boxes 871-882
Arrangement: roughly chronological.

Correspondence and subject files of the Director and Assistant Directors, press releases, radio and television public service announcements, and production books comprise this subseries. The Public Relations Division deals with the print and broadcast media, through which it informs the public about CARE's goals, policies, and short and long-term programs, promotes various fund-raising campaigns and issues press releases about them.

Boxes 871-882 are the files of the Public Relations Directors, Sam Kaufman (ca. 1953-1970), Emma Dash Gregory (ca. 1973-1975) and Alex Klein (1975-1981). The Public Relations Directors work in conjunction with the Assistant Public Relations Directors in responding to questions from the public and providing the print and broadcast media with up-to-date information on CARE projects and activities. They also communicate frequently with CARE missions staff concerning the need for photographs and "human interest" stories to use in promotional literature.

The files of the division's two Assistant Directors are in Boxes 883-898. Boxes 883-890 are those of the Editorial Director (also called the Press Relations and Public Information Director), mostly from the mid-1970s to the early 1980s. Items in some cases duplicate those in the Public Relations Directors' files, but are in general more recent. Box 883 contains biographical sketches of many CARE staff and members of the Board of Directors, prepared by the Editorial Division, mostly in the 1970s, with a few files contributed more recently by other departments. Of note in Box 886 among the files on the International Year of the Child (1979) is a letter from the writer E. B. White, giving CARE permission to quote from a passage in Charlotte's Web.

Boxes 891-898 contain the Broadcast and Special Events Director's files, 1952-1984. Concerned mainly with television and radio, the Director sets up opportunities to air CARE material, and prepares and approves the copy to be used. Box 891 contains the subject files of Dorothea Beckman, 1952-1967, including several on the Hale and Baker Agency, which represented CARE in acquiring air space and studio time for CARE productions.

Box 892 contains more of Beckman's files and her successor's, Jules Evan Baker, formerly of the Hale and Baker Agency. Boxes 893-898 are solely Jules Baker's, 1957-1984, containing correspondence and special events information.

Roughly one-half of Subseries 4.2 (Boxes 899-931) consists of copies of press releases and television and radio public service announcements, mostly from the late 1940s and 1950s. Boxes 899-902 hold a nearly complete run of general press releases in numbered volumes, from 1946-1958. (The papers have been removed from binders and placed in folders.) Boxes 903-905 contain scattered press releases not found in the above volumes, 1949-1985. Box 906 contains foreign press releases, 1949-1960.

Boxes 907-916 hold special press releases. Whereas general releases are sent out to all forms of media and organizations, special releases go to specific groups; for example, to the labor press or to regional radio stations, such as those in the Ohio Valley area. These are in numbered books in chronological order. (Many of the later books are missing.) Boxes 917-918 contain press releases pertaining to MEDICO.

Boxes 919-924 contain radio and television scripts, from 1949-1979, in numbered volumes. Such public service announcements are 10-60 seconds in length, and are generally pleas for contributions for ongoing projects, though such emergencies as the Iranian earthquake of 1982 warrant special announcements. There are also holiday campaign ad spots. Box 925 contains various scripts not included in the volumes.

Boxes 926-931 contain production books, the rough drafts and early ideas that were the basis for articles as well as for the above radio and television scripts. The books run from 1956-1957, followed by a gap of twenty years. There is a second run from 1977 through 1979.

<u>Subseries 4.3. Donor Services Files.</u> 1946-1984 (bulk ca. 1965-1975). 14 l.f. Boxes 932-945.

Correspondence with donors and fund-raising organizations, memos, procedure manuals, and other materials. Most of these files are those of Franklin Irving, Director of Donor Services

(also called the Service Division) from ca. 1958 to 1975. Though not directly involved in fund-raising, this division handles contributions, answers inquiries from the public, maintains files on donors and coordinates Lions Clubs International's work for CARE.

Boxes 932-934 represent a 30% sampling of CARE's files on individual and institutional donors, mostly from ca. 1960-1972. Files include copies of thank-you letters from the Donor Services Director and mission chiefs, describing in detail the uses to which contributions would be put, as well as worksheets, receipts, and occasional incoming correspondence from donors.

Boxes 937-942 contain a 10% sampling of CARE's files on the fund-raising work of Lions Club chapters in the U.S. and Canada. (Because of the volume of Lions Club material, Donor Services oversaw these activities, rather than the National Organizations Department of Resource Development.) Files are in chronological order by year, 1966-1977, and alphabetical by state and district within each year. As with the donor files, each Lions Club file typically includes copies of outgoing letters to donors, worksheets, and receipts.

Boxes 943-944 are those of David Jack, Assistant Director of Donor Services and a graphic artist who designed many of CARE's early brochures and pamphlets, 1948-1953. His files include correspondence, occasional discursive reports, drafts of promotional literature, and press releases.

<u>Subseries 4.4.</u> National Field Operations/Resource Development Division Files.

1958-1984. 59 l.f. Boxes 946-1004.

Arrangement: roughly chronological according to section.

Correspondence to and from field staff, personnel data, field reports, donor files, correspondence with national organizations, and other materials make up this subseries. The Field Operations Division is primarily concerned with the fund-raising efforts of CARE's eighteen regional offices in the U.S. and Canada, and with the generation of income through foundations and corporate donors, bequests, and mass mailings, as well as through the work of other non-profit organizations in CARE's

behalf.

Boxes 946-957 contain the files of the National Field Operations Director, later the Resource Development Director. Boxes 946-951 contain John "Jack" Leonard's files (1958-1968), which pertain mostly to fund-raising campaigns. Boxes 946-948 feature various campaigns such as the Vicks-CARE Crusade. Boxes 949-951 contain the files of the Combined Federal Campaign and the Federal Services Joint Campaign. Both were efforts by the government to generate interest among federal employees in government-approved charities.

Box 952 contains the correspondence of Everett Thorner (1969-1971) with various field offices. Gordon Haskell succeeded Thorner and held the position until 1978. Boxes 953-956 are his files. Box 953 deals with various field personnel from 1960-1975. Box 954 contains field correspondence. Boxes 955-956 are further fund-raising files. Box 957 contains Susan Overman's files, including correspondence, field conference data, and computer system implementation information.

Boxes 958-965 contain the Field Staff Director's files from 1965-1983. These files primarily were maintained by Michael Kraeg, Field Operations Director, who coordinated the work of the various field offices and channeled communications between CARE headquarters and field office staff. He worked closely with the national Field Operations Director. The bulk of his files consists of correspondence to and from the field offices.

The Division's field offices files, 1956-1984, are stored in boxes 966-979. These contain correspondence between each office and the national headquarters in New York, press clippings about local events, information on fund-raising techniques, and personnel data. Boxes 966-972 contain monthly reports from the various offices, filed alphabetically by city, describing contact with donors as well as in-house matters. (Readers should note that the reports from the Ottawa and Toronto field offices are filed under "Canada.")

The contents of boxes 973-975, Washington, D.C. Field Office files, 1956-1983, were transferred from that office at the time

of its move to smaller quarters. Of note is its involvement in CARE's 25th anniversary celebration. Boxes 976-978 contain the Tri-State (New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut) Field Office files, 1967-1984. In addition to the usual promotions, Box 978 includes various Christmas, Mother's and Father's Day, and MEDICO campaigns. Box 979 is from the Philadelphia Field Office, 1977-1984, containing press clippings and files of the donating foundations in the Philadelphia area. (The Tri-State and Philadelphia offices closed in 1984, but have since re-opened.)

Boxes 980-989 hold the files of the National Organizations Division, which coordinates the fund-raising activities of other non-profit societies on CARE's behalf. These societies, many of which are CARE member agencies, include the American Legion Auxiliary, the 4-H Program, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National Council of Negro Women, the National Grange, and Rotary International. Usually, organizations raise monies for specified projects: for example, in 1959, American 4-H Club chapters provided farm tool kits and hand cultivators for sister clubs in Mexico.

The National Organizations files consist mostly of correspondence between the National Organizations directors and CARE missions and field offices concerning the work of the donor organizations, as well as brochures, reports, and other information about those organizations. Coverage is strongest for the General Federation of Women's Clubs (Boxes 983-986) a member of CARE since 1954 and one of its most active fund-raisers.

Boxes 990-995, the records of the Foundations Division (renamed Corporations/Foundations/Major Donors after 1980), are mainly files on individual foundations (Boxes 990-992) containing copies of letters of acknowledgment from CARE, occasional incoming correspondence from donors, and worksheets, copies of receipts, and action forms explaining how each contribution would be used. Files date from 1952 to 1980; coverage is strongest for 1960-1975. They represent a 20% sampling of CARE's inactive Foundations files. Box 993 contains files pertaining to two major gifts from the late 1970s-mid-1980s.

The remaining files, ca. 1980-1987, are those of the Foundations Division's Assistant Director (Box 994) and the Director of Corporate Affairs (Box 995). The contents of both include copies of outgoing memos, information sent to and from field offices, and related administrative matters.

Boxes 996-999 contain a 20% sample of the Planned Giving Division's files on deceased donors who left part or all of their estates to CARE, 1969-1982. They consist mostly of correspondence between CARE and estate attorneys, and copies of wills and other legal documents.

The Direct Mail Division (Boxes 1000-1001) designs and distributes CARE's mass mailings to past and potential donors, and monitors the income generated by those mailings. Box 1000 includes examples of brochures and other appeals to donors from 1946 to 1983.

The Special Events Division of CARE (Boxes 1002-1004) coordinates the activities of the Public Relations Department, which plans promotional and fund-raising events, and the work of Resource Development, which carries them out. Most of these files are those of the Special Events Coordinator, Linda Porto, from 1980-1981; they consist mainly of memos to and from field office staff and CARE administrators, and files on such fund-raisers as radiothons and telethons and on the design of posters and brochures.

Subseries 4.5. Miscellaneous Materials. 1946-1987. 4.8 l.f. Boxes 1005-1010.

Printed matter, including press clippings, articles, and CARE newsletters; union-related files, thank-you letters, and other items.

The files in Box 1005 are chiefly those of CARE's AFL-CIO representatives, who worked with the AFL-CIO and its member unions in fund drives to provide food and self-help kits to trade unionists in CARE countries. There are also two files pertaining to the activities of the Union of CARE Employees, 1947-1949 and 1963.

Box 1006 contains CARE fact sheets, brochures, and a variety of newsletters, including a nearly complete run of <u>CARE World Report</u>, Winter 1972-73 through Summer 1989, and various internal bulletins. Among other materials in Box 1006 are examples of press kits, and information on the contents and distribution of CARE packages, 1946-1970. Box 1007 holds an assortment of newspaper clippings and magazine articles concerning CARE from the 1940s through the mid-1980s.

About half the contents of Box 1008 pertains to preparations for CARE's 25th, 30th, 35th, and 40th anniversary celebrations. The remaining files contain information on various fund-raising projects, 1949-1983, CARE's nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize in 1951 and 1987, and such items as commemorative stamps and copies of letters to CARE from U.S. presidents and other political figures.

Box 1009 contains some of the few available examples of letters of gratitude from recipients of CARE's assistance. Most of these were forwarded to CARE by the Union of Orthodox Jewish

Congregations of America, which provided for the shipment of numerous kosher CARE packages between 1950 and 1952. The remainder, ranging from the 1940s to 1988, were written directly to CARE.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 5 FINANCIAL CONTROL AND PROCUREMENT FILES

1947-1984 (bulk ca. 1955-1970). 24.5 l.f. Boxes 1011-1037

Budget plans, statistical tables, grant applications, memos, and other items from CARE's Finance and Procurement departments. The former, called Administrative Operations before 1964 and Financial Control from ca. 1964 to 1981 deals with the budget, payroll, and other monetary concerns of CARE, and includes its Accounting, Remittance, Treasury and Insurance, and Data Processing divisions. The Procurement Department is responsible for the acquisition of agricultural commodities, MEDICO supplies, general and special purchases, and the shipping of all such materials.

The items in this series represent only a small sample of those generated by either department. CARE has retained its recent Finance Department files and apparently routinely discarded most earlier ones. A January 1976 memo to Jack Thacher from Howard Powell, director of Procurement, mentions that the Procurement Department destroyed most of its inactive files in the early 1970s, owing to space limitations.

Subseries descriptions follow.

Subseries 5.1. Finance Department Files. 1947-1984. 22.5 l.f. Boxes 1011-1034 Arrangement: by division.

Files of Lou Samia, Assistant Executive Director for Administrative Operations and Deputy Executive Director, 1958-1977 (Boxes 1011-1013); files of the Accounting and Statistics Division, 1947-1980, especially those of the comptroller, Richard Vogler (Boxes 1014-1021); Treasury and Insurance Division directors' files, 1950-1981 (Boxes 1022-1028); Remittance Division files, 1947-1962 (Boxes 1029-1031); and files of Richard LaRoche, director of the Budget Office, 1981-1984 (Boxes 1032-1034). Materials are of a fairly routine nature, reflecting the day-to-day operations of each division. Of some note is a 1947 survey of German-American housewives in the Yorkville section of

Manhattan who sent CARE packages to Germany. (Box 1031)

<u>Subseries 5.2. Procurement Department Files.</u> 1965-1968. 2.5 l.f. Boxes 1035-1037 Arrangement: chronological, and alphabetical within each year.

The only Procurement Department files represented here are the overseas correspondence files of the department's director, Richard Vogler, 1965-1968. They mostly contain numbered letters between Vogler and the various mission chiefs (many of which are also in the Overseas Operations files), concerning the obtainment and shipment of materiel, interspersed with discursive reports, annual programming rationales, etc.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 6 MEDICO

1956-1986 (bulk 1962-1980) 89 l.f. Boxes 1038-1126

HISTORICAL NOTE

MEDICO (Medical International Cooperation Organization), the medical arm of CARE, began under the sponsorship of the International Rescue Committee in February 1958. Its co-founders were Peter D. Comanduras, a faculty member of George Washington University's School of Medicine, and Thomas A. Dooley, a former U.S. Navy physician who had assisted in the evacuation of refugees from North Vietnam in May 1954 and returned in 1956 to establish a hospital in a remote part of Laos. Comanduras's research in the mid-1950s on tropical medicine convinced him of the need for a non-governmental medical organization that would replicate on an international scale the work being done by Dooley and by Albert Schweitzer in Africa. After corresponding for several months about the possibility of starting such an organization, Comanduras and Dooley met in the fall of 1957, and from that and subsequent discussions, they created MEDICO, with Comanduras as its secretary-general and Albert Schweitzer as an honorary patron. A Medical Advisory Council (later Advisory Board), comprised of representatives of various medical professional organizations, helped to establish the criteria for MEDICO programming and offered specific recommendations based on their areas of expertise.

From March to June 1958, Comanduras met with government officials and health care workers in twenty-five nations to discuss MEDICO's potential role there, while Dooley embarked on a lecture tour to raise funds and attract volunteers. Response at home and overseas was positive, and that summer and fall, MEDICO sent teams of medical personnel to various sites in Laos, Cambodia, and Jordan. By September 1959, when it became independent from the International Rescue Committee, MEDICO also had short-term and long-range projects underway in Afghanistan, Kenya and South Vietnam, and had participated in emergency disaster relief efforts in Morocco, Peru, and Chile.

Dooley died in January 1961, and without its energetic publicist and fund-raiser, MEDICO soon fell into financial difficulties. That fall, Comanduras proposed a formal

affiliation between MEDICO and CARE. Since 1959, the two organizations had been cooperating closely in countries where both operated, with CARE supplying materiel and MEDICO the personnel. Each agency was amenable to the merger, and in March 1962, MEDICO became a service of CARE, and Comanduras its assistant executive director. Kester L. Hastings, MEDICO's executive director, became an assistant director, based in Washington, DC; his chief responsibility was the recruitment of visiting volunteer specialists (VVSes). Wells Klein of CARE oversaw the placement of long-term staff and related administrative matters. (Henry Selz replaced Klein in 1963, and was succeeded in 1964 by Leonard Coppold, who held that position until 1979. For more information, see the organizational charts at the end of this guide.) MEDICO's Advisory Board continued to provide overall medical programming guidance.

Freed from having to raise its own monies, MEDICO expanded its ongoing activities in the countries in which CARE was active, particularly Afghanistan, Jordan, and Algeria. In the 1960s, it started programs in Honduras, Tunisia, and the Dominican Republic, where CARE had been working for some time, and sent teaching teams to Indonesia in 1968, a year after CARE began operations there.

During the 1960s, MEDICO began moving away from what one CARE A.E.D. called "the 'jungle medicine' of Dooley"--the establishment of hospitals and clinics in remote areas where most people had never seen a doctor--toward the postgraduate training by MEDICO contract staff and volunteers of their counterparts at medical schools and hospitals in metropolitan areas. Contract personnel usually served overseas for two years, administering and overseeing teaching programs, while VVSes spent one or more months at those sites, offering their expertise in such needed specialties as anesthesiology and orthopedic surgery.

The international approach to Third World health care began to shift in the 1970s toward a focus on comprehensive public health education and on the provision of primary health care (PHC) in regions without ready access to sophisticated forms of medical treatment. Although it favored service to rural areas over urban centers, PHC differed from the earlier Dooley/Schweitzer philosophy in advocating the incorporation of preventive measures such as better sanitation and improved nutrition into a health care program, and in stressing community participation: rather than furnish doctors from outside, health care workers would teach basic medical skills to the traditional health care providers of a community, e.g., midwives.

In recognition of this shift, the MEDICO Advisory Board sponsored a workshop in April 1976, "Future Directions of CARE-MEDICO," which resulted in a set of recommendations that

included: a wider use of medical paraprofessionals as well as doctors; more attention to preventive (as opposed to curative) medicine; a focus on rural rather than urban health care; and increased community involvement. During the next few years, CARE and MEDICO staff members participated in various regional and international meetings on health care, in particular the World Federation of Public Health Associations conference in Halifax, Nova Scotia in May 1978 and the International Conference on Primary Health Care, sponsored by the World Health Organization and UNICEF, in Alma Ata, USSR, in September 1978. Attendees at the Alma Ata conference drafted a series of ten statements, known as the Declaration of Alma Ata, which set a goal of a worldwide acceptable level of health by the year 2000, through primary health care "in the spirit of self-reliance and selfdetermination," achieved with the help of local and national governments and private organizations.

The immediate result of the new concentration on primary health care was an effort on MEDICO's part to work more closely with CARE's Program Department, particularly on its health and nutrition projects. Most MEDICO Advisory Board members and staff, however, were medical specialists with little public health experience and no clear ideas on how to proceed in changing MEDICO's direction. Additionally, budgetary constraints prevented plans to hire a full-time PHC specialist to coordinate CARE and MEDICO programming and to add such specialists to CARE's mission staffs, while rising operating costs and a decreased demand overseas for highly trained medical experts gradually reduced MEDICO's use of visiting volunteer specialists. By early 1983, the VVS program had come to an end.

With financial curtailments and without a clearly-defined role to play in CARE programming, MEDICO gradually ceased to be an active division of CARE. Today, although three former MEDICO Advisory Board members sit on CARE's Board of Directors, MEDICO exists essentially in name only.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

There are 89 boxes of files in the MEDICO series, mainly containing administrators' correspondence, end-of-tour reports by contract personnel and volunteer specialists, VVS personnel files, and minutes of meetings and other materials of the MEDICO Advisory Board. Items date from MEDICO's earliest days to the mid-1980s.

Researchers should note that in 1981, at the request of the Western Historical Manuscript Collection of the University of Missouri in St. Louis, CARE donated several files of original correspondence from Tom Dooley to the W.H.M.C.'s Thomas A. Dooley

III Collection.

Materials are arranged in nine subseries:

Related MEDICO materials can also be found in the files of Ralph Devone (Program Department Box 104) and in Boxes 863-870, the files of Jack Thacher and Ron Burkard, Assistant Executive Directors of the Public and Donor Relations Department.

Subseries descriptions follow.

<u>Subseries 6.1. General and Historical Materials.</u>
1958-1984, and undated. 3 l.f. Boxes 1038-1040
Arrangement: roughly chronological.

Articles of incorporation, by-laws, fact sheets, histories and chronologies, clippings, press releases, and other material documenting the founding and growth of MEDICO. Box 1038 includes brochures and other printed items from MEDICO's pre-CARE years, and a 62-page pamphlet, "The Story of MEDICO, a Service of CARE," by Terry Morris, issued in 1976. The contents of Box 1039 are mostly manuals and newsletters, including a complete run of MEDICO Records (1966-1983), a newsletter published by CARE for the Society of Alumni and Friends of MEDICO, a fund-raising organization of former MEDICO volunteers. (See Box 1125.)

Box 1040 contains documents and chapter outlines compiled for a proposed history of MEDICO (never published) and correspondence with the author, James Newton, 1966-1968. (Related materials are in the files of Jack Thacher, Box 863.) Of particular interest in Box 1040 is a transcript of the diary of a MEDICO doctor, John Amati, kept during his service in Cambodia from 1962 to 1964.

Subseries 6.2. MEDICO Advisory Board & Board of Directors Files. 1958-1986. 5 l.f. Boxes 1041-1045

Arrangement: Boxes 1041, 1042, and 1045: chronological. Boxes 1043 and 1044: alphabetical by Board member.

Minutes of meetings of the MEDICO Advisory Board (MAB) and its various committees, lists of committee members,

correspondence between MEDICO staff and Board members, annual reports from CARE's Program Department to the Board, and other materials.

After its separation from the International Rescue Committee, MEDICO was governed by a twenty-six-member Board of Directors that included business and civic leaders as well as Tom Dooley, and by its Medical Advisory Board, whose membership had grown to nearly forty by early 1962. The two combined at the time of the CARE/MEDICO merger to form the MEDICO Advisory Board.

Most of these files are those of Kester Hastings and his successors in Washington DC, and include agendas, announcements, and minutes of the meetings of the MAB and its numerous standing committees (Boxes 1041 and 1042) as well as correspondence with individual Board members (Boxes 1043 and 1044). The contents of Box 1045 are from the New York assistant directors' office, and consist mainly of correspondence concerning MAB activities.

Boxes 1042 and 1045 also contain material pertaining to Orthopedics Overseas and the MEDICO Advisory Committee of Canada. The former, a volunteer organization of orthopedic surgeons founded in 1959, was a member agency of MEDICO from 1961 to 1981. CARE of Canada instituted its own MEDICO program in 1963, owing largely to MEDICO's popularity among Canadian doctors and nurses, who comprised about one-fourth of MEDICO's volunteers.

<u>Subseries 6.3. Pre-Merger Files.</u> 1956-1963 (bulk 1958-1961). 6 l.f. Boxes 1046-1051 Arrangement: alphabetical.

Chiefly correspondence and reports documenting MEDICO's activities during the three years before it merged with CARE. The files are mostly those of Peter Comanduras and Kester Hastings. Boxes 1046-1048 concern operations and proposed projects in 40 countries; coverage is most extensive for Afghanistan, Haiti, Jordan, Laos, and Vietnam. Boxes 1049-1051, subject files, consist mainly of correspondence with other organizations and individual doctors.

<u>Subseries 6.4. MEDICO Assistant Executive Directors' Files.</u> 1962-1980. 9 l.f. Boxes 1052-1060 Arrangement: alphabetical.

Memos, correspondence, reports, speeches, surveys, and other items concerning ongoing projects and programming policies and objectives for CARE/MEDICO. Boxes 1052-1057 are country files; 1058-1060 are subject files, including AEDs' reports on overseas sites, correspondence with Advisory Board members, and files on

medical organizations and conferences, including the Halifax and Alma Ata conferences of 1978 (Box 1060). Box 1058 also contains Comanduras's files on the CARE/MEDICO merger.

<u>Subseries 6.5. Assistant Directors' Files: New York Office</u> 1961-1982. 26 l.f. Boxes 1061-1086 Arrangement: alphabetical.

Country files, subject files, and programming files, mostly containing correspondence and reports.

Contents of the pre-1970 country files (Boxes 1061-1070) closely resemble and in many instances duplicate those in the AEDs' country files, but in general pertain more to day-to-day operations abroad than to overall planning. Post-1970 country files (Boxes 1071-1075) show the assistant director's expanded role in overseeing MEDICO projects, as well as a closer connection between MEDICO and the CARE Program Department. The subject files (Boxes 1076-1079) mainly concern such administrative matters as budgets, publicity, recruitment, etc.

Boxes 1080-1086 are Leonard Coppold's files on MEDICO programming, particularly the Visiting Volunteer Specialists program. Boxes 1083 and 1084 contain the collection's most complete set of the reports that were required of returning specialists, describing their experiences and the working conditions they encountered overseas. These reports are arranged alphabetically by country; other copies can be found in Box 1096, filed by year; by name of specialist in Boxes 1098-1108, and scattered among administrators' country files.

Subseries 6.6: Program Department MEDICO Files.
1967-1984 (bulk 1970-1984). 10 l.f. Boxes 1087-1095
Arrangement: Boxes 1087-1092: alphabetical; Boxes 1093-1095: chronological.

In 1970, Frank Goffio, then CARE's executive director, announced the restructuring of MEDICO. In order to develop a closer relationship between MEDICO and other types of CARE programming, the assistant executive director (AED) for Overseas Operations assumed overall responsibility for MEDICO personnel, with Coppold and Hastings reporting to him. The programming aspects of MEDICO fell under the administration of the Program Department AED. Ethel Spore, a registered nurse who had worked for MEDICO since 1963, filled the newly-created position of medical program officer.

Pre-1970 items in Subseries 6 are mostly from CARE's former central research library; post-1970 files are those of Ethel

Spore and her successors, Mary Lewis and Roy Brown. Boxes 1087-1092, country files, mainly concern specific MEDICO projects and consist chiefly of correspondence between the missions and the New York office, progress reports, and nursing and other procedure manuals for each country. The contents of Boxes 1093-1095, subject files, are arranged in rough chronological order and include general information on MEDICO programming, files on conferences, including the Halifax and Alma Ata conferences of 1978, and correspondence, especially with overseas staff. Much of this correspondence is in the chronological, or "running" files of the medical program officers.

<u>Subseries 6.7: Various Reports.</u> 1962-1979. 2 l.f. Boxes 1096-1097 Arrangement: Box 1096: chronological. Box 1097: alphabetical by country.

Box 1096 contains a set of Visiting Volunteer Specialist reports, arranged by year, from 1967 to 1979, probably from CARE's onetime library. Box 1097 holds the Narrative and Clinical Reports (also sometimes called monthly or discursive reports, which became quarterly after mid-1971) submitted by the team captains of long-term MEDICO personnel, dating from 1962 until their discontinuance in 1973. The reports generally discuss the work of VVSes and other staff members, noteworthy examples of patient care, and new and ongoing projects, and occasionally include statistics on the nature and number of medical procedures undertaken.

<u>Subseries 6.8. Assistant Directors' Files: Washington, DC Office.</u>

1959-1982. 27 l.f. Boxes 1098-1124 Arrangement: Boxes 1098-1108: alphabetical by specialist's name; Boxes 1109-1112: by numbered category (see below); Boxes 113-1124: alphabetical by country.

Correspondence, reports, personnel rosters, and other items from the Washington DC files of Kester Hastings, and, after 1973, his successors, Chris Schieffle and George Mathues. Materials fall into three categories: VVS personnel files (Boxes 1098-1108), correspondence and subject files (Boxes 1109-1112), and country and program files (Boxes 1113-1114).

The Washington office had its own numeric filing system, a copy of which is in Box 1109. It provides for extreme specificity: e.g., 340.5.1 is the sub-category for reports on the Indonesia plastic surgery program. The general categories are:

100: Communications, mostly between the DC office,

CARE's New York office, and overseas missions

- 200: Medical specialists, particularly VVSes
- 300: Country and Program files
- 400: MEDICO Advisory Board
- 500: Organizations and Embassies
- 600: Accounting
- 700: Personnel: job descriptions, travel expense reports, etc.
- 800: Miscellany, including information on donations, publicity, etc.

With some exceptions, most notably the bulk of the MEDICO Advisory Board files, which are in Boxes 1041-1044, the original order has been maintained where possible.

Boxes 1098-1108 contain the files kept on each volunteer specialist. There is very little of a confidential nature; most folders include correspondence between the assistant director and the volunteer concerning recruitment, travel arrangements, etc., and copies of the specialists' end-of-tour reports. In some folders are resumes or MEDICO application forms.

Boxes 1109-1112 are subject files, mostly from the 1960s to mid-1970s. 1109 and 1110 contain the correspondence files (100s), to and from the New York office and each MEDICO country. Box 1110 also includes general information on the VVS program (200s), and several folders on MEDICO-affiliated organizations.

The contents of Box 1111 are files on other institutions (500s), financial records (600s), chiefly <u>re</u> petty cash and medical supplies; personnel information (700s), mostly pertaining to temporary help and the VVS program; and miscellany (800s), primarily publicity-related.

Box 1112 contains unnumbered subject files, C-P. About one-third pertain to the International Eye Bank (International Eye Foundation after 1964), an ophthalmologists' association sponsored by MEDICO from 1961 to 1968.

Boxes 1113-1124, country and program files (300s), consist almost entirely of correspondence and reports concerning specific overseas projects and general programming information. Many items are copies of materials in New York offices files.

<u>Subseries 6.9. Miscellaneous Materials.</u> 1963-1986. 2 l.f. Boxes 1125-1126. Arrangement: roughly chronological.

The contents of Box 1125 pertain to the Society of Alumni and Friends of MEDICO: correspondence, membership lists, and

materials from its meetings, annual luncheons, and anniversary celebrations. The Society was founded in 1965 by MEDICO supporters and personnel who had served with MEDICO, to assist in recruitment, publicity, and fund-raising.

For other information on the Society of Alumni and Friends of MEDICO, see Box 863, the files of Jack Thacher, Assistant Executive Director of the Public and Donor Relations Department from 1966 to 1975.

Box 1126 mostly contains correspondence, invitations, guest lists, and other items concerning MEDICO's Humanitarian Awards Luncheons, and the presentation of Certificates of Appreciation from CARE/MEDICO to donors, staff, and volunteers. The remaining few files do not fit neatly into other MEDICO subseries; they include literature on immunology and communications technology, and a folder on Tom Dooley Heritage, Inc., a fund-raising organization for the Tom Dooley Memorial Hospital in Thailand.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 7 CARE INTERNATIONAL

1967-1986. 19 linear feet. Boxes 1127-1145

CARE International, a network of CARE organizations in eleven countries, had its origins in two of CARE's affiliates, CARE Canada and CARE Europe. The former came into existence as directors of CARE's field offices in Toronto and Ottawa perceived the need for more autonomy. Already known as CARE of Canada since 1947, the Canadian field offices incorporated officially under that name in 1967. The following year, CARE's New York headquarters authorized the creation of a separate CARE Advisory Board for Canada, which gave more decision-making power to CARE officers there. In 1973, CARE of Canada, by then called CARE Canada, became an independent agency.

CARE Europe grew out of the work of the International Lions Club in West Germany, which created and ran the fund-raising campaign "Dank An CARE" (Thanks to CARE) in 1972. The campaign was highly successful, and led to the establishment of a CARE agency in Europe, headquartered in Bonn, in 1976. When Germany instituted its own CARE affiliate in 1981, CARE Europe moved its headquarters to Paris. By then, CARE Norway had been created and plans for CAREs in Italy and Britain were underway, their popularity, as in Norway, France, and Germany, attributable largely to the fact that many Europeans remembered CARE's assistance to them after World War II and were eager to have the chance to aid others in need through CARE organizations.

In 1979, planning had begun for the creation of a formal operating body called CARE International, based at the New York offices of CARE (which had become CARE U.S.A.), to assist with fund-raising and to coordinate and prevent duplication of efforts among the various CARES. CARE International held its first organizational meetings on January 29, 1982, with representatives from CARES Canada, Germany, Norway, and the U.S.A. participating.

Membership in CARE International has continued to grow steadily. By the end of the 1980s, there were CARE International affiliates in eleven countries.

Series 7 is arranged in four subseries:

- 7.1. Internationalization
- 7.2. CARE Canada
- 7.3. European Members
- 7.4. Various Materials

Subseries descriptions follow.

<u>Subseries 7.1. Internationalization</u> 1978-1982. 1 l.f. Box 1127

Subseries 7.1 consists of the files of various CARE administrative personnel, apparently compiled by CARE archives staff, containing memos, planning papers, minutes of meetings, and other items that document the move toward internationalization and the formal creation of CARE International on January 29, 1982. There are also three cassette tapes of the proceedings of a CARE International meeting in 1982. (The information on the tapes gives the date of the meeting as June 29, but it is more likely January 29.)

<u>Subseries 7.2. CARE Canada</u> 1967-1986. 12 l.f. Boxes 1128-1139

Boxes 1128-1129 of Subseries 7.2 mostly contain numbered letters and cables, similar to the numbered correspondence of CARE's Overseas Operations Department, documenting CARE Canada's move toward autonomy; there are also annual reports, newsletters, and other items in Box 1129. Boxes 1130-1139 hold project files, kept by CARE U.S.A.'s Donor Services Division, on overseas activities sponsored by the Canadian International Development Agency (C.I.D.A.) through CARE Canada, 1976-1986.

<u>Subseries 7.3. European Members</u> 1976-1985. 5 l.f. Boxes 1140-1144

As with Subseries 7.2, the first two boxes in this subseries contain numbered correspondence between CARE U.S.A. and its European affiliates, 1976-1984, mostly concerning administrative matters. In the remaining boxes are the Donor Services Division's project files on the work of CARE Europe, CARE Norway, and other overseas affiliates, 1977-1985.

Subseries 7.4. Various Materials 1977-1986. .3 l.f. Box 1145

Subseries 7.4 consists of scattered folders from the late 1970s and early 1980s, mostly concerning CARE Europe. There is also one folder of promotional brochures about the various CAREs, in their native languages, ca. 1981-1986.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

SERIES 8 PEACE CORPS

1960-1967. 20 l.f. Boxes 1146-1165

HISTORICAL NOTE

First proposed by President John F. Kennedy during a campaign speech in November 1960, the Peace Corps was established by his executive order on March 1, 1961. As originally envisioned by its creators, the Peace Corps would send volunteers to developing countries for two years to work with local community leaders in improving conditions in such areas as education, food production, and sanitation.

In its formative period, the Peace Corps carried out its activities in partnership with non-governmental organizations. Because of CARE's ongoing work in Colombia, a country that had requested Peace Corps volunteers, Peace Corps staff sought CARE's participation in implementing its pilot project, a community development program that was initiated in a number of localities in rural Colombia. In May 1961, CARE and the Peace Corps formalized an agreement for joint operations in Colombia. CARE staff members assisted in the screening of applicants and designed the initial training program for Peace Corps Volunteers (PCVs), held at Rutgers University in New Jersey from June through August of that year. The first contingent of CAREtrained PCVs left for Colombia that September; others followed over the next five years. There were also CARE/Peace Corps cosponsored projects in Sierra Leone, Pakistan, Guatemala, and Turkey.

CARE's involvement in later projects was less extensive than in the original Colombia venture, as the Peace Corps gradually assumed responsibility for the selection and training of its volunteers. For several years, CARE continued to provide country project directors (called CORs, or contractors overseas representatives, by the Peace Corps, who approved each appointment); their tasks were to guide the work of PCVs in projects proposed by CARE's Program Department and to coordinate activities with CARE, the Peace Corps, and the officials in each country. James Lambie, CARE's A.E.D. in Washington, D.C., served as the liaison between the Peace Corps and CARE headquarters.

As its own staff expanded and acquired more experience in

international development work, the Peace Corps' need for the assistance of private organizations decreased. CARE's formal involvement in Peace Corps activities ended in 1967.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The bulk of Series 8 consists of contracts, budget proposals, administrative correspondence, and progress reports, as well as items pertaining to the selection and training of each contingent of volunteers. Most of the files are those of CARE's Program Department staff members: Gordon Alderfer, the Program Department A.E.D. in 1961; Ralph Greenlaw, Program Department Director; and Merton Cregger, director of the Colombia Peace Corps Project. There are also Peace Corps files of Lou Samia, then the A.E.D. for Administrative Operations, and those of James Lambie, A.E.D. for special assignments.

The Peace Corps files are arranged in four subseries:

- 8.1. Countries
- 8.2. General Files
- 8.3. Washington, D.C. Files of James Lambie
- 8.4. Printed Materials

PEACE CORPS SUBSERIES DESCRIPTIONS

<u>Subseries 8.1: Countries.</u> 1960-1967. 15 l.f. Boxes 1146-1160.

Correspondence, contracts, budgets, reports, training course materials, and other items concerning the creation and implementation of CARE/Peace Corps projects in Colombia (Boxes 1146-1154), Sierra Leone (Boxes 1155-1157), Guatemala (Box 1158), Pakistan (Box 1158), and Turkey (Boxes 1159-1160). Box 1146 also contains files documenting the beginnings of the CARE/Peace Corps partnership and the establishment of the first training program for volunteers at Rutgers University in 1961.

Files for each country include copies of the contracts between CARE and the Peace Corps, proposals for projects (rural community development, public health, and so forth), project budgets, materials from the training programs for PCVs, such as course syllabi and biographical sketches of the participants; progress reports, and correspondence, including ALVOLs, the administrative memos sent to all PCVs in a country.

Coverage is most extensive for activities in Colombia, where twelve contingents of PCVs served between 1961 and 1966.

Box 1151 contains an in-depth study of the first contingent of Colombia PCVs by Morris Stein, a professor of psychology at New York University.

<u>Subseries 8.2: General Files.</u> 1961-1966. 2 l.f. Boxes 1161-1162.

This subseries consists of the combined files of AEDs James Lambie and Lou Samia, concerning the overall operation of the CARE/Peace Corps program. About one-fourth are proposals for new PC projects, apparently never carried out; one half are subject files, A through F and M through T. (The whereabouts of subject files G through L are unknown.) Included here are the Peace Corps' first five annual reports, 1962-1966 (Box 1161), and recruitment literature, promotional brochures, clippings, and a capsule history of CARE-Peace Corps relations, written by Lambie in 1967 (Box 1162). The remaining one-fourth of Subseries 8.2 are mostly administrative items: blank insurance forms and volunteer questionnaires, medical manuals, and so forth.

<u>Subseries 8.3: Washington, DC Files of James Lambie.</u> 1961-1964. 2 l.f. Boxes 1163-1164.

Chronological correspondence files of James Lambie, CARE's A.E.D. for Special Assignments, who was based in Washington from 1961 to 1964, where he served as the liaison between CARE and various government branches and agencies, including the Peace Corps. Most of the letters in this subseries are second copies of correspondence between other CARE staff members, concerning routine Peace Corps-related matters.

<u>Subseries 8.4: Printed Materials.</u> 1961-1966, and undated. .5 l.f. Box 1165.

Chiefly scholarly studies of Peace Corps training programs or assessments of a project's impact, conducted by such institutions as the National Education Association and the Cornell University Department of Anthropology. There is also a copy of the May 1966 Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, which is devoted entirely to the Peace Corps, and includes an essay on Peace Corps-private sector joint operations.

SERIES DESCRIPTION

SERIES 9 AUDIO-VISUAL MATERIALS

1947-1985 (bulk 1968-1979). 4.5 l.f. (ca. 230 items.) Boxes 1166-1169

Subseries 9 consists of posters, charts, films, slides, and sound recordings, chiefly reel-to-reel tapes. Most of these items were produced by the Public Relations Department for promotional purposes, or by the Program Department for use overseas in health education projects.

As mentioned in the Scope and Content Note, CARE has retained most of its audio-visual materials, chiefly photographs, slides, motion pictures, and videotapes. Items in Series 9 were separated during processing from the Public Relations and Program Departments files in which they had been stored.

Subseries descriptions follow.

<u>Subseries 9.1. Posters</u> 1947-1985. 2.5 l.f. (ca. 100 items) Boxes 1166-1167

Box 1166 contains two oversize pictorial volumes: <u>The Sierra Leone Nutrition Storyboard</u>, and a scrapbook of nutrition education materials in the two national languages of Sri Lanka. Both items are undated, but are probably from the late 1970s.

Box 1167 contains three main types of posters: ca. twenty-five CARE organizational charts and related items, 1947-1985, designed for in-house use; about fifty Public Relations Department posters from the 1950s to the early 1980s, aimed at North American audiences, promoting CARE's various fund-raising campaigns; and roughly fifteen health and nutrition education posters from the Program Department, in a variety of languages, for use overseas, ca. 1960-1979.

There are also approximately ten nutritional education posters stored separately in the charter case.

Subseries 9.2. Slides, Tapes, and Sound Recordings
ca. 1968-1984. 2 l.f. (ca. 130 items) Boxes 1168-1169

Materials in Box 1168 are almost all from the files of Jules

Baker, the Public Relations Division's Director of Broadcast and Special Events. Items include three 45-RPM records and ca. twenty-five cassette and reel-to-reel tape recordings of public service spots for CARE, ca. 1981-1984; and thirty-four slides and two films from CARE's Combined Federal Campaign drive, 1975-1976. Other items in Box 1168 include scattered slides used in various fund-raising campaigns, mostly from the early 1980s, and several tapes of CARE executives' overseas visitation reports, primarily from the mid-to-late 1970s.

Box 1169 consists entirely of forty-nine reel-to-reel tapes from the proceedings of CARE's September-October 1968 regional conference. Transcripts are in Box 850 of the World and Regional Conference Files, Subseries 3.9.

Scope and content note

Arrangement note: The records are arranged in four series with many subseries; the numbering sequence is a continuation of the earlier records as follows: Series 10, Management Files, 1945-1997 is a continuation of Series 1; Series 11, Program Department Files, 1961-1997; continues Series 2; Series 12, Overseas Operations Files 1961-1990; continues Series 3; and Series 13, Donor and Public Relations Files, 1979-1990 continues Series 4.

The CARE additions span the dates 1945-1997, with the bulk of the records documenting the 1970s and 1980s. These additions contain the original minutes of the Board of Directors of CARE, 1945-1991, from the organization's inception as a relief organization assisting war-torn Europe after World War II, to a modern 21st century organization that has expanded relief and extended self-reliance to developing countries.

Notable among these additions are the records of the Presidents of CARE. Series 10, Management 1945-1994, hold the files of President Edwin J. Wesley and Philip Johnston, President and Chief Executive Officer. The files of both of these presidents span over thirty years, Wesley from 196's through the 1980s, and Johnston's files from the 1970s to the mid 1990s. Johnston's records offer the most complete and detailed record for a former President and CEO. Other important administrator files include those of George H. Radcliffe, the Executive Vice-President. Radcliffe held a variety of positions with CARE and his records span the 1960s through the early 1990s. Overall, the files of CARE's top executives provide additional insight into policy-making decisions during the late 20th century. Series 10 also holds the records of CARESBAC, a CARE agency concerned with small business development. Founded in 1989, CARESBAC eventually became an independent non-profit agency known as SEAF (Small Enterprise Assistance Funds) in 1995.

The Program Department records, 1961-1993, form the largest series in the Additions. CARE developed projects in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, and Central and South America, tackling issues such as agro-forestry, education, nutrition for mother and child, farming, and small business development. Most of the CARE records were generated by the former New York Headquarters before CARE moved to Atlanta in 1993.

10.4 George H. Radcliffe, Executive Vice President, 1953, 1967-

George H. Radcliffe held several different managerial positions during his tenure at CARE. As reported in Series 1, Subseries 1.6, Radcliffe's administrative responsibilities were for the Program Department and Overseas Operations, circa 1980, and by 1985 he held the position of Assistant Executive Director for Care International Service. Radcliffe's files span the period of his tenure as AED to his position as Executive Vice President.

10.4.1 Subject Files, 1967-1991

This subseries, 1967-1991, is arranged topically; and focuses mainly on the administrative work of CARE. The bulk of the files are memos concerning internal decisions made by the Board of Directors, the President of CARE, and other mid to upper level administrators of CARE USA and CARE International. Radcliffe regularly corresponded with Philip Johnston concerning issues under discussion in CARE. Memos between Radcliffe and Johnston span the years 1981 through 1990. Topics would include information regarding meetings with management, CARE International issues, executive staff meetings, budgets, and concerns regarding CARE member countries following established policies of CARE. The files indicate that Radcliffe focused a considerable amount of time identifying and dealing with issues of concern to CARE International, e.g., compensation for overseas employees, international meetings, operating budget, recruitment for member countries, and security for CARE personnel. There are some early files that predate Radcliffe's tenure, regarding talks of "internationalization" of CARE dating from 1967.

The files contain background documents, by-laws, correspondence, drafts, memoranda, notes, project reviews, and printed matter.

Devone's files consist entirely of Country files including correspondence with CARE Country Directors; position papers on the socioeconomic status of the host country; daily reports from countries receiving aid, carbon copies of reports from the field on issues of concern. There are reports on such crises as the Nicaraguan floods of 1982, and emergency feeding in southern Sudan in 1980.

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11.1.6.2 General: Management and Staff, 1985-1990

This subseries, 1985-1990, is a combination of material created by the Regional Technical Advisors (RTAs) and CARE staff. The RTA's primary responsibility was to assist missions in developing sector strategies, to plan and implement project evaluations, to train CARE staff in program and technical matters, and to provide support for Country Offices in the implementation of projects.

The files contain cables, correspondence, memoranda, notes, printed matter, and workshop evaluations.

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11.2 Regional Management Group, 1975-1994

The files offer extensive documentation of CARE projects in East Africa, West Africa, Southern Africa, Asia, and Latin America. This series is arranged in six subseries:

11.2.1.1 CARE International Missions Files and Subject Correspondence, 1977-1994

The correspondence consists mainly of interoffice memoranda regarding CARE members' support of East Africa. Other issues of concern include the rapid spread of AIDS throughout Africa and the need to educate CARE staff about the problem, CARE Canada's support for famine and drought relief, and CARE Deutschland projects in East Africa.

The Subject Correspondence, 1980-1994, represents other projects undertaken in East Africa, c1985-1990, especially those to combat drought and famine brought on by environmental conditions and war.

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11.2.1.2 Country Files, 1975-1991

The files are not in strict alphabetical order, but are filed according to the internal numbering system used by CARE. The files generally contain a basic agreement with the host country, reports on trips made by CARE to assess the development of projects; land and soil conservation multiyear plans; contracts, correspondence, interagency memoranda, proposals, trip reports, AIPs (Annual Implementation Plan) and PIEs (Planning, Implement and Evaluation).

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11.2.2 West Africa Unit, 1980-1992

The West Africa Unit documents CARE humanitarian projects in several West African countries: Angola, Cameroon, Chad, the Congo, Mali, Niger, Sierra Leone and Togo. The series is arranged in two subseries. 11.2.2.1 Country Files, 1980-1992; 11.2.2.2 Correspondence; AIPs, PIEs, 1980-1992

11.2.2.1 Country Files, 1980-1992

This subseries, 1980-1992, is arranged alphabetically by country. The files are not in strict alphabetical order but reflect the internal numbering system used by CARE.

Information is present on several CARE projects and proposals in West African countries. The bulk of the activity for these projects occurred during the 1980s. Individual project files include an evaluation of Cameroon's "Eastern Potable Water Project," a five-year project, by independent evaluator Andre Baillot. Baillot spent a month traveling throughout the Eastern Province examining all the project sites completed by CARE. Baillot's report published, in 1982, provides detailed information on the project. How conditions such as drought and civil war affect a country can be read in the project narrative report for Chad sent to CARE Headquarters from Tuskegee University.

11.2.2.2 Correspondence, AIPs, PIEs, 1980-1992

This subseries, 1980-1992, is arranged alphabetically by country. Information on a country's AIPs and PIEs (if available) are filed with the host country.

CARE-Angola was established in 1989 in the middle of a civil war that resulted in the loss and displacement of thousands of Angolans. The files contain documentation on Cameroon's Potable Water Projects, Chad's rural reconstruction, multiyear project proposal for establishing improved nutritional practices for mothers and children in the Congo, and the Dioila-Kangaba Wells project in Mali. The latter project was established in 1981 in cooperation with the Organization of Netherlands Volunteers (ONV). Mali was facing a drought when the combined efforts of CARE and ONV built seventy village wells to supply clean drinking water.

11.2.3 Southern African Unit, c1980-1992

This subseries, c1980-1992, offers partial documentation of CARE's work in Southern Africa. Lesotho and Mozambique are the only countries represented from the southern part of the continent. Arranged under the heading "Lesotho Project," the files document project supervised by CARE and other humanitarian organizations such as Catholic Relief Services (CRS). While there is no record for CARE's work in Lesotho during the late 1960s, the period of CARE's initial foray into Lesotho, there is some documentation for the early 1970s. The bulk of the files document the 1980s.

The correspondence, reports focuses on the economic viability of Lesotho's national economy and the projects under operation during the 1980s. The subjects include country profiles, development of native industry such as the Lesotho hand-spun mohair project (samples with correspondence); the phase-out of the Catholic Relief Services Maternal Child Health program, ca. 1988; food projects; and the work of ICFARM (Improved Community Forestry and Agriculture Management) from 1984-1991.

The files on Mozambique are mostly proposals for projects that included CARE Italy's proposal for four-wheel drive vehicles to meet the need of

transporting good from various locations, the integrated rural development program for the Cabora Bassa District, and a report on Mozambique's multiyear planning. The files contain correspondence, country profile, evaluations, memoranda, multiyear plans, project reports, trip reports, and PIEs.

11.2.5.2 PACA-Peru FY 1985-1993

Proyecto Ambiental Para Centro America (PACA or Central America Environmental Project) operated in Belize, Costa Rica, Honduras, and Nicaragua. PACA's purpose was to promote wildlife management, environmental education, conservation information and strategic planning and policy. Costa Rica was PACA's home base. David Kauck was the Regional Coordinator for PACA. A National Project Coordinator was assigned to each country. This person worked with the CARE country mission and regional office of PACA to provide overall management and coordination for planning, implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of the PACA project.

11.2.5.3 Child Survival Assistance Program FY 1988-1990

The United States Congress passed legislation, P.L. 100-276, to provide humanitarian aid to the Nicaraguan Resistance. President Ronald Reagan signed this act into legislation in 1988. Part of the legislation included 17.7 million for the Children's Survival Program (CSAP) to help Nicaraguan children with medical relief. This also included Nicaraguan children and their families who fled to Costa Rica and Honduras. Nine private voluntary organizations (PVOs) including CARE, the American Red Cross, Catholic Relief Services, and the World Rehabilitation Fund received grants. In 1988, the Agency for International Development sent a letter to Rudolph von Bernuth, Director of Program Operations, that gave CARE \$1,000,000 in funding.

This subseries contains correspondence and reports that document issues relating to CSAP, including CARE reports on the program, assessment reports from Costa Rica, budgets, requests for reports from CARE on their humanitarian work, and requests from CARE officers to modify the program to take into account the health/food needs of Costa Ricans not directly affected by the war in Nicaragua.

The files contain correspondence, financial data, memorandum, press releases, proposals, and reports spanning a three-year period.

11.2.6 Emergency Assistance Unit (EAU), 1982-1993

The function of the Emergency Assistance Unit (EAU) was to provide immediate assistance in crisis situations. The EAU began shortly after setting up relief operations in Somalia circa 1980. In 1981, CARE signed a tripartite agreement with UNHRC and the Somali National Refugee Commission. Following this agreement, CARE Somalia signed the Basic Country Agreement with the Somalia government. This agreement allowed CARE to develop projects in reforestation, agriculture, and refugee self-reliance.

CARE operations were put on hold briefly from December 1990 to March 1991 after Somalia erupted into civil war. Despite problems in food distribution, safety and other hazards, CARE continued to operate in Somalia. The EAU material is arranged in two subseries. 11.2.6.1 Somalia, 1982-1993 and 11.2.6.2 Conference Files; Program Files

Additional material relating to Somalia/EAU is located in 1.2.1.2. Country Files Somalia/ EAU, 1975-1991, boxes 1256, 1257, and 1258.

11.2.6.1 Somalia and Ethiopia, 1982-1993

11.3 Technical Assistance Group, 1976-1992

The Technical Assistance Group (TAG) should not be confused with the Program Department's original name "Technical Assistance and Self-Help Programs." TAG specifically documents CARE's overseas programs in agriculture, health care, and economic development for small businesses.

The subseries is arranged in four subsubseries. 11.3.1 Agriculture and Natural Resources (ANR) 1979-1991; 11.3.2 Primary Health Care (PHC) 1976-1992; 11.3.3 Small Economic Activity Department (SEAD) 1976-1990; 11.3.4 Food Programming Unit (FPU) c1980-1991

11.3.1 Agricultural and Natural Resources, 1979-1991

CARE defines ANR as a program to increase the agricultural productivity of farming communities while preserving the surrounding ecosystems. Currently, CARE operates agricultural and natural resource projects in forty-two countries. Only a portion of these countries is reflected in the files. The objective of these projects is to work with farmers to increase their crop and livestock yields through animal husbandry, home gardening, planting new seed varieties, and irrigation.

The files are arranged in two subseries. 11.3.1.1 Country Files, 1981-1991; 11.3.1.2 General Files, 1979-1991.

11.3.1.1 Country Files, 1981-1991

This subseries consists mainly of the files of John Michael Kramer, Program Coordinator of the Renewable Natural Resources Department. The Renewable Natural Resources Department was the former name of the ANR. There is a three-year gap in the files. When the files resume in 1988 Kramer has been promoted to the Director of the ANR. Remko Vonk succeeded Kramer as the Director.

This subseries is arranged alphabetically by country for each year. The bulk of the files document the work of the ANR under Kramer's administration. Subjects include technical assistance, sharing information about specific projects, e.g., information sent to Ecuador about training of soil conservators in Guatemala (box 1338, f. 5), and requests for CARE-generated materials supporting renewable natural resources. Other topics mentioned include Cameroon Community Forestation Project, vehicles for Haiti, work with other groups such as the Peace Corps, and various topics relating to the budget. The countries include Bolivia, Cameroon, Chad, Haiti, Guatemala, Kenya, Niger, Nepal and Peru.

11.3.2 Primary Health Care, 1976-1992

Primary Health Care (PHC) is the second department represented in the Technical Assistance Group. The main objective of the PHC is to develop projects that would improve primary health care in the host country. This service would include prenatal care, basic health and nutrition services for mothers and children, and basic health care training. Mary Ruth Horner was the Director of PHC during this time.

11.3.3 Small Economic Activity Development (SEAD), 1975-1993

SEAD is the final program represented in the Technical Assistance Group records. SEAD conducted programs to improve the economic security and income opportunities for impoverished people by promoting sound moneymaking activities and building strong financial institutions. In 2006, CARE had 131 SEAD projects in 39 countries, 90 percent for women.

Only a fraction of the countries CARE presently assists are represented in this series. The programs documented cover mainly the 1980s. Two organizations that worked on similar projects were PACT (active) and Partnership for Productivity (PfP). PACT is a private voluntary organization founded in 1971. The organization's objective is to empower people to earn a dignified living through grass roots organizations and related projects.

Partnership for Productivity (PfP) was a private voluntary organization that also worked for economic development in the Third World. Founded by an American Quaker in 1969, PfP developed into an international organization that performed consultancies around the world. These PfP files indicate that CARE assumed responsibility for PfP projects after PfP dissolved. The files were transferred to CARE. These files provided the necessary information for CARE to continue projects already underway and start other programs. The U.S. Agency for International Development provided the funding for PfP programs.

The files are arranged in three subseries. 11.3.3.1 Country Files, c1979-1987; 11.3.3.2 PISCES; SBCD; SEFO/BAS (Liberia) 1976-1986; 11.3.3.3 CARE/PfP, 1975-1993.

11.3.3.1 Country Files, ca. 1979-1987

The files, 1979-1986, document SEAD/PfP initiatives in Asia, Caribbean, Latin America, and Africa. The objective of the programs was to provide an incentive for the local economy to be self-sufficient. Agro-economy proved to be a major focus of these initiatives.

Jamaica is an example of a country that received SEAD assistance. The objective of the program was to develop the agribusiness sector of the island's economy. During the early 1980s studies determined that there was a need to reduce reliance on imported food and reduce idle land. SEAD aimed to improve the living standards of farmers, consumers and market intermediaries; reduce post harvest losses; and increase producers' share of the final price.

Lesotho was another SEAD beneficiary. During the 1980s, migrant labor was expected to return as jobs abroad declined. In order to meet this demand PfP proposed to increase agriculture programs, have small manufacturers become more efficient, and create new businesses that would generate jobs.

The files contain activity reports, cables, correspondence, country profiles, data, financial information, memoranda, notes, printed matter, project proposals, reports, and trip reports.

11.3.3.2 PISCES; SBCD; SEFO/BAS (Liberia) 1976-1986

In 1978, the US Agency for International Development sought proposals from organizations to review and develop the Small Scale Enterprise. The Peace Corps developed PISCES. With the success of PISCES, the Peace Corps wanted the Small Development Office to develop an inservice training program that would integrate small enterprises development concepts into all the Peace Corps programs. Partnership for Productivity (PfP) submitted the successful bid to develop this program.

Small Business Capacity Development (SBCD) files, 1984-1986, contain an assessment/evaluation of the work conducted by PISCES. The countries include Bolivia, Djibouti, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Egypt, Haiti, Malawi, Philippines, Somalia, Sri Lanka, and many islands in the Caribbean.

The Small Enterprises Financing Organization (SEFO) and the Business Advisory Service (BAS), ca. 1982-1986, were two separate organizations working together to advance small businesses in Liberia. The records indicate that SEFO and BAS had a difficult relationship. A draft report by USAID/Liberia noted that SEFO mismanaged their loan portfolio, and BAS did not expend the time necessary to generate creditworthy clients for SEFO. This resulted in a "Memorandum of Understanding",1986 to better coordinate the work between these two entities.

11.3.3.3.2 SEAD: CARE/PfP Transition, 1985-1992

This subseries is arranged alphabetically. These files, 1985-1992, document CARE's small business projects in developing countries. Some of the material concerns transitional matters as CARE assumed PfP operations. Also of interest are the files documenting the emergence of new projects and additional countries as CARE took over SEAD operations. CARE's small business operations is known as CARESBAC (Small Business Assistance Corp see also Sub series 10.2.2.4 CARESBAC, 1988-1993).

At the end of this subseries is the CARE Marketing game that was designed circa 1991 by Nick Ritchie and Robin Poppe for CARE SEAD workers in Niger. This game comes complete with cards, pegs and the board.

11.3.4 Food Programming Unit (FPU), ca. 1980-1991

The purpose of the Food Programming Unit (FPU) was to ensure appropriate and improved use of food aid in conformity with CARE's food use policy and guidelines. The FPU is most closely related to the Primary Health Care Unit (PHC).

The subseries is arranged in two subseries: 11.3.4.1 Food Assistance to Iraqi Kurds 1991; 11.3.4.2 Emily Morre, Director of Food Programming c1984-1990

11.3.4.1 Food Assistance to Iragi Kurds, 1991

This subseries documents food distribution to Iraqi Kurds after the Gulf War. CARE reported that in March 1991, over one million Kurds left their home in northern Iraq fleeing to Turkey and Iran, to escape bombardment from the Iraqi army. Turkey requested help for international assistance, and CARE immediately made an assessment of the conditions under which thousands of refugees were living. By June 1991, CARE assumed responsibility for food distribution in all of northern Iraq. CARE was also instrumental in establishing stability in the refugee camps.

The files include some correspondence, lists of families that detail information on who is the head of the household, number of persons in household, identity card number and other information; and additional detailed information about the distribution process.

13.2 Communications Group, 1969-1993

The Communications Group was responsible for getting CARE's message out to the public. This included film production, media releases, and promotion of photo features, publications, and public relations and publicity. For example, during the year 1986, the Communications Groupt engaged in several activities. Three films were produced: "Crisis in Africa: A Call for Brotherhood"; Famine in Africa", and "Forty Years of Caring". During that same year, the Associated Press and three hundred newspapers accepted eight photo features. Publications also play an important part in the Communications Department. 75,000 copies of the 1985 Annual report were printed and distributed. The quarterly CARE World Report with a circulation of 580,000 in 1985 generated \$500,000 per issue. One special focus of public relations and publicity was on CARE's 40th anniversary events.

13.2.1 Don Poh. Director of Communications, 1983-1987

Media played a major part in raising public awareness about CARE particularly through print and broadcast media. CARE advertised in newspapers nationwide including The Boston Globe, The New York Times, and The Los Angeles Times to solicit donations. Similar advertisements were taken out in subscription publications. CARE usually called for immediate financial support from the public for current disasters such as the 1985 earthquake in Mexico.

A hallmark of CARE efforts to raise funding were theme campaigns such as Campaign for Africa, and Child Survival Campaign. These campaigns were packaged so that the potential donor would be educated about the crisis and persuaded to donate money. CARE also hired outside consultants to guide them in running a more effective operation for fundraising. During the mid 1980s, 61% of CARE fundraising efforts were targeted at Africa.

Subjects include annual reports, cooperation between CARE and pharmaceutical companies such as MEDICO's use of drugs in developing countries donated by Abbott (see also 13.2.9 MEDICO), "News from CARE", internal memoranda regarding publicity in all media, memoranda from CARE's regional offices in the United States, and discussions about how to design CARE posters and related publicity,

The files contain correspondence, drafts, memoranda, mock ups, notes, photographs, posters, press releases, printed matter, promotional material and reports.

13.3 Development Education, 1981-1991

Because continuation of CARE's mission depended upon an educated and active base of support in the United States, CARE embarked upon a public awareness campaign about critical international issues in the early 1980s.

A financial boost came from Sec.316 (b) of the Biden-Pell amendment to the International Security and Development Cooperation Act of 1980. It urged the Director of the ISDC to provide assistance to private and voluntary organizations engaged in facilitating public discussion of hunger and other related issues. In 1981, the Agency for International Development established one-year grants to private voluntary organizations or PVOs to undertake a wide variety of development education activities in towns and cities in the United States. CARE became a Biden-Pell grant recipient in 1984.

The files, 1981-1991, concern collaborative educational programs. CARE sponsored activities and programs at schools to raise the awareness of the urgent conditions in developing countries. An example of a successful national program was the Balloons for Child Survival launched in 1987. This one-day event had children from around the country and one high school in the Soviet Union launch helium filled balloons to bring attention to the fact that 3 million children die each year from preventable diseases. This initial launch raised nearly \$250,000.

Another major activity of the Development Education Department was CARE cooperative efforts with the agricultural industry of the Midwestern United States.

13.3.1 Subject Correspondence, 1981-1991

The files are indicative of several successful programs originated and sponsored by CARE in cooperation with other non-governmental organizations or NGOs. For example, "Growing Up in the World" developed by Nancy Blum, was a traveling educational exhibit targeted at children 12 years of age and older. As an interactive exhibit, the objective was to encourage interest in health and development programs.

Another excellent example of a program for school-age children was entitled "The Last Forest." Developed circa 1989, this program targeted junior and senior high school students. The purpose of the program was to educate students about tropical deforestation, and how CARE and other organizations were combating the problem.

These packages were designed as motivational tools, not necessarily as fundraisers. CARE loaned the videos to schools and other educational institutions with the understanding that they were to be returned promptly after use for distribution to other schools. Files under the subject heading "Schools" contain surveys of students' knowledge of the rain forests. Note: There are no educational videos in the collection.

The theater production One World Rap! written by George Sanchez, for

CARE was a highly successful theater production about life in the developing world. This innovative program toured schools in the New York area. The files document the popularity of the program by the numerous requests for the production to appear at local schools. The files under the subject heading "Schools" contain evaluations of the theater production.

The final group of files concerns Sharing Global Harvests (SGH). SGH was one of CARE's most successful projects active between July 1984-January 1987. This project was funded from a Biden-Pell grant through the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) in 1984. The objective was to involve national farm organizations with large, established membership in a collaborative education project. Three farm organizations were selected to participate in the project named Food AID and the American Farm Community. These organizations were the National Cooperative Business Association, The American Farm Bureau Federation, and the National Farmers Union.

The files contain budget, cables, correspondence, drafts and memorandum about the development of the educational programs, evaluations, faxes, flyers, photographs, memorandum, notes, press kits, printed matter, reports, and summaries.

13.4 Foundation Division, 1950-1990

The focus of the Foundation Division (renamed Corporations/Foundations/Major Donors after 1980) was to raise large sums of money for CARE projects. The Foundation Division is arranged into two subseries. 13.4.1 Foundation Files, 1950-1979; 13.4.2 Regional Directors, 1986-1990.

13.4.1 Foundation Files, 1950-1979

The files contain information on individual and corporate foundations. There are copies of letters of acknowledgment from CARE to donors, internal memoranda covering a variety of subjects relating to donations including corporate sponsorship of projects, meetings with foundations, project proposals from CARE, project proposals from corporations, allocation of funding, reports to foundations about how their contributions aided CARE projects, and related subjects .

The files contain correspondence, drafts, faxes, memorandum, photographs, receipts, reports, and service analysis sheets.
