#### **Biographical Note**

Montgomery Clift was born in Omaha, Nebraska on October 17, 1920, hours after his twin sister Roberta (Ethel). He lived with his father William Brooks Clift, his mother Ethel "Sunny" Fogg Clift, and his older brother William Brooks, Jr. In the mid 1920's his family moved to Chicago and later, in the early 1930's the family settled in New York City.

At the age of twelve, Montgomery Clift made his first stage appearance in an amateur production of *As Husbands Go* in Sarasota, Florida. His professional stage debut was in a Stockbridge, Massachusetts production of a new comedy called *Fly Away Home*. In 1935, he made his Broadway debut in a New York production of *Fly Away Home*. Later that year he opened in a Broadway musical *Jubilee*. Other Broadway plays include *Yr*. *Obedient Husband, Eye on the Sparrow, Dame Nature, The Mother, There Shall Be No Night* with Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne, *The Skin of Our Teeth* with Tallulah Bankhead, *The Searching Wind, Foxhole in the Parlor*, and Tennessee Williams' *You Touched Me!*, but it was never produced. Other plays he appeared in are *The Wind and the Rain, Out of the Frying Pan, Our Town*, and *Mexican Mural. The Sea Gull* in 1954 was his final stage appearance.

In 1946 Clift made his first film, a western entitled *Red River*, opposite John Wayne. Due to a delay in the release however, his film debut was *The Search* in 1948 which earned him an Academy Award nomination for best actor. Later that same year *Red River* was finally released. In 1949 he co-starred with Olivia DeHavilland in the film *The Heiress* and went to Germany to film a World War II movie *The Big Lift*. He earned two more Academy Award nominations for best actor for his performances in *A Place in the Sun* (1951) and *From Here to Eternity* (1953). His co-star in *A Place in the Sun*, Elizabeth Taylor, became one of his long time friends. He made two more films with Elizabeth Taylor, *Raintree County* (1957) and *Suddenly, Last Summer* (1959).

On May 12 1956, Montgomery Clift was involved in a near fatal car accident after leaving a dinner party at Elizabeth Taylor's house in Beverly Hills. The accident disfigured his face, leaving it half paralyzed. Despite his injury he continued to make movies. He appeared with Marlon Brando, Dean Martin, and Hope Lange in *The Young Lions* (1958). He co-starred with Marilyn Monroe and Clark Gable in the film *The Misfits* (1961). He also earned his fourth Academy Award nomination for best supporting actor for his 7-minute performance in *Judgment at Nuremberg* (1961). In 1966, he made his last film entitled *The Defector*. Other films include *I Confess* (1953), *Indiscretion of an American Wife* (1953), *Lonelyhearts* (1958), *Wild River* (1960), and *Freud* (1962).

He died in New York on July 23, 1966 in his sleep. The cause of death was occlusive coronary artery disease. Later that year his last film *The Defector* was released.

#### **Scope and Content Note**

The papers of Montgomery Clift contain correspondence, scripts, photographs, notes, and scrapbooks. The collection is divided into eight series correspondence, writings, four series of scripts, personal papers, and scrapbooks.

The strength of the collection is the scripts. Some of the scripts, especially the produced scripts, range from early drafts to final drafts and most contain annotations by Montgomery Clift providing the researcher insight into Clift's involvement with the roles he created. Another aspect of the collection reveals Montgomery Clift's ambition to do his own writings. The collection contains original manuscripts of the screenplay *You Touched Me!* from the play by Tennessee Williams. The screenplay, written by Montgomery Clift and his long time friend Kevin McCarthy, was never produced.

Mexican Mural: this side was Montgomery Clift's copy for his character Lalo Brito in the play written by Ramon Naya. The play opened in 1942. The Mother: this side was Montgomery's copy for his character Tony in the play written by Karel Capek. The play opened in 1939. Road to Paradise: this side was Montgomery Clift's copy for the character Robin in the play by Frederick Jackson. It opened in Jamaica, Queens on July 6, 1936. It includes handwritten music from the play. The Sea Gull: was Montgomery Clift's final play. It opened in New York City on May 11, 1954. There are several drafts and some written notes by Clift. *The Searching Wind*: this side was Montgomery Clift's copy for his character Samuel Hazen in the play by Lillian Hellman. The play opened in New York City on April 12, 1944. The Skin of Our Teeth: a clean copy of the script by Thornton Wilder. Montgomery Clift played the role of Henry Antrobus. The cast included Morton DaCosta and Tallulah Bankhead. The play opened in New York City on November 18, 1942. It also includes a side for the character Henry Antrobus. There Shall Be No Night: this side was Montgomery Clift's copy for his character Erik Valkonen in the play by Robert E.

This series contains screenplays for the films of Montgomery Clift. Some scripts have several drafts with written notes and other production materials such as cast lists and shooting schedules. Also included in the collection is the handwritten music for Clift's bugle solo of "Chattanooga Choo Choo" from the film From Here to Eternity. This series also contains scripts of a radio and a television program. Montgomery Clift acted in a total of seventeen films during his career. The scripts re arranged in alphabetical order with the radio and television programs at the end. The produced scripts include: *The* Big Lift: released on April 26, 1950, written and directed by George Seaton. A World War II film shot in Germany, Montgomery Clift played Sgt. Danny McCullough. The series contains two drafts of the screenplay with annotations by Montgomery Clift. The Defector: this was Montgomery Clift's last movie and was released four months after his death, November 16, 1966. It was directed by Raoul Levy and written by Robert Guenette, Raoul Levy, Lewis Gannet, and Peter Franke. The script was based on the novel *The Spy* by Paul Thomas. Montgomery Clift played the lead role Professor James Bower. There are several drafts of the screenplay with annotations by Montgomery Clift. Freud: released on December 12, 1962, directed by John Huston and written by Charles Kaufman and Wolfgang Reinhardt. A film about the life and work of Sigmund Freud. Montgomery Clift played the role of Dr. Sigmund Freud. The series contains several drafts and revised scenes of the screenplay with written annotations by Montgomery Clift. From Here To Eternity: directed by Fred Zinnemann and written by Daniel Taradash from the novel by James Jones. Montgomery Clift played Private Robert E. Lee Prewitt. Other cast members include Burt Lancaster, Deborah Kerr, Frank Sinatra, Donna Reed, Ernest Borgnine, and Philip Ober. The film was released on August 5, 1953. The series contains two early drafts of the screenplay with handwritten music for Clift's bugle solo of "Chattanooga Choo Choo." Glass Menagerie: a play written by Tennessee Williams and was recorded on radio with Montgomery Clift. The series contains two annotated copies of the script used by Montgomery Clift during the recording. I Confess: directed by Alfred Hitchcock and written by George Tabori and William Archibald from the play Our Two Consciences by Paul Anthelme. Montgomery Clift played the role of Father Michael Logan. The film was released on March 22, 1953. The series contains the final draft of the screenplay. Indiscretion of An American Wife: also titled Terminal Station, was

directed and produced by Vittorio de Sica and written by Cesare Zavattini. Montgomery Clift played Giovanni Doria. The film was released on June 25, 1954. The series contains three early drafts of the screenplay annotated by Montgomery Clift. Judgment at Nuremberg: directed and produced by Stanley Kramer and written by Abby Mann. It was released on December 19, 1961. The film was about the Nazi war crime trials at Nuremberg in 1948 and starred Spencer Tracy, Burt Lancaster, Richard Widmark, Marlene Dietrich, and Judy Garland. Montgomery Clift's 7-minute performance as Rudolf Petersen earned him a nomination for best supporting actor. The series contains early drafts and a final draft of the screenplay with annotations. Lonelyhearts: released on March 4, 1959, was directed by Vincent Donehue and written by Dore Schary based on the novel Miss Lonelyhearts by Nathanael West. Montgomery Clift played Adam White, a newspaper columnist. This series has a bound final draft that contains movie stills from the film. Several revised drafts of the screenplay are also in the series. The Misfits: Montgomery Clift played the part of Perce Howland and co-starred with Clark Gable, Marilyn Monroe, and Eli Wallach in this film directed by John Huston and written by Arthur Miller. It was released on February 1, 1961. The series contains revised drafts of the screenplay. A Place in the Sun: co-starred Montgomery Clift and Elizabeth Taylor for the first time. Montgomery Clift earned best actor nomination for his performance as George Eastman. It was released on August 28, 1951 and was directed by George Stevens and written by Michael Wilson and Harry Brown based on the novel and play American Tragedy by Theodore Dreiser. The series contains a final draft with light annotations by Montgomery Clift. Raintree County: Montgomery Clift's second film with Elizabeth Taylor and also starred Eva Marie Saint and Lee Marvin. The film was directed by Edward Dmytryk and written by Millard Kaufman. It was released on December 20, 1957. Montgomery Clift played the lead role of John Shawnessy. The series contains revised drafts of the screenplay and additional scenes with annotations. Red River: Montgomery Clift's first film was not his screen debut since it was released five months after The Search. A western film with Montgomery Clift opposite John Wayne, it was released on September 30, 1948, directed by Howard Hawk and written by Borden Chase and Charles Schnee. The series contains a final draft of the screenplay. The Search: Montgomery Clift's screen debut although it was his second film, having been released five months before Red River. He earned a best actor nomination for his performance as Sgt. Ralph "Steve" Stevenson in this film about children in Germany after World War II. It was released on March 24, 1948, directed by Fred Zinnemann and written by Richard Schweizer. The series includes a film treatment of the story and an early draft of the screenplay. Suddenly Last Summer:

	<ul> <li>Montgomery Clift and Elizabeth Taylor's third film together also starred Katherine Hepburn. It was released on December 22, 1959, directed by Joseph L. Mankiewicz and written by Gore Vidal based on the play by Tennessee Williams. The series contains the first draft of the screenplay and two revised drafts. <i>Wild River</i>: released on May 26, 1960, directed by Elia Kazan and written by Paul Osborn was based on the novels <i>Mud on the Stars</i> by William Bradford and <i>Dunbar's Cove</i> by Borden Deal. The series has an early draft, revisions, and a final draft of the screenplay. <i>The Young Lions</i>: featured an all-star cast that included Montgomery Clift, Marlon Brando, Dean Martin, and Hope Lange. It was released on April 2, 1958, directed by Edward Dmytryk and written by Edward Anhalt based on the novel by Irwin Shaw. The series contains the first draft continuity, revisions, and a clean draft of the screenplay. <i>William Faulkner's Mississippi</i>: a television special on William Faulkner's heritage and his writings concerning the southern resistance to desegregation. Montgomery Clift narrated this documentary along with Zachary Scott. It was broadcast in April 23, 1965 and was released as a motion picture in 1967. <i>Glass Menagerie</i>: written by Tennessee Williams in 1945, was recorded in a New York studio in 1964 with Montgomery Clift, Jessica Tandy and Julie Harris.</li> </ul>
